

Mark Muro is a fellow and the director of policy for the Brookings Institution's [Metropolitan Policy Program](#), and research director (Washington, D.C.) of the Brookings Mountain West Initiative. At Brookings, Mark manages the program's public policy analysis and leads key policy research projects. Muro managed and co-wrote with Robert Lang the landmark study "[Mountain Megs: America's Newest Metropolitan Places](#)." He is also the author of "MetroPolicy: Shaping a New Federal Partnership for a Metropolitan Nation" and two major reports on the federal stimulus program: "Metro Potential in ARRA: An Early Assessment of the American Recovery and Reinvestment" and, most recently, "Implementing ARRA: Innovations in Design in Metropolitan America." These reports represent key elements of the metro program's *Blueprint for American Prosperity* initiative, an ambitious multi-year project to build long-term U.S. prosperity by revitalizing the federal relationship with metropolitan areas.

Muro is also the author of recent publications including "Reconnecting Massachusetts' Gateway Cities: Lessons Learned and an Agenda for Renewal," "Charting Maine's Future: An Action Plan for Promoting Sustainable Prosperity and a Sustainable Future," and "Back to Prosperity: A Competitive Agenda for Renewing Pennsylvania."

Prior to joining Brookings, Muro was a senior policy analyst at the Morrison Institute for Public Policy at Arizona State University. He was also a staff writer for *The Boston Globe* and an editorial writer for *The Arizona Daily Star*. Muro is a member of the Citistates Group, a network of journalists, speakers, and civic leaders focused on building competitive, equitable, and sustainable 21st century metropolitan regions. He holds a bachelor's degree from Harvard College and a master's degree in American studies from the University of California, Berkeley.
