Credentials: All requests for press and/or photo passes must be made at least one calendar week before the game and it is preferred that they be in writing. UNLV has only limited seating along press row, however, some additional seating in the stands is available and we will do all we can to accommodate legitimate members of the working press corps.

Statistics: UNLV supplies complete NCAA game statistics, including play-by-play, all team and individual statistics, half-time quickie stats, and post game quotes. "Quickie" team stats are also provided along press row to all broadcasters during every time-out. The UNLV statistical crew for the 1981-82 season returns in full for their ninth season with the Runnin' Rebels. We salute them and thank them for their years of donated and dedicated services to the program. They are: Michael Mlynarczyk (Head Statistician), ~~Ken and Pam Hicks (Play-by-play)~~, Tim Smith (Turnovers, Assists, Steals and Blocked Shots), Duane Neel (Shots Attempted), Jim Thomas (Rebounds), Harold Frazier (Minutes Played), John and Barbara Horn, Brent LaFevbre and Steve and Jeff Mlynarczyk (Runners).

Press Room: The press room is located adjacent to the UNLV bench in the rotunda of the Las Vegas Convention Center, under the sign which says, "Section A". It is open to all media personnel upon display of the official 1981-82 UNLV basketball press credential issued only through the UNLV Athletic Ticket Office. A pre-game meal is served two hours before the scheduled tip-off time, one telecopier and five telephones are available on a first-come, first-served basis.

Interviews: Post-game interviews are conducted on an informal basis outside of the team locker rooms. Following a 10-minute cooling off period, both locker rooms will be open, upon approval of the respective coaches, to members of the media.

1981-82 UNLV BASKETBALL OUTLOOK

UNLV Hopes to Bounce Back in 1981-82 with Vets and Promising Newcomers

Winning.

It's something that UNLV head basketball coach Jerry Tarkanian is used to doing, quite frequently. He's the winningest active college coach in America and the third winningest coach of all time. Entering his ninth season at UNLV, he is 182-53 (.774) and in 13 years of major college coaching, he was the head mentor at Long Beach State from 1968-73, he is 304-73 (.806).

In fact, because of Tarkanian, UNLV is the 12th winningest college basketball team in the U.S. during the last 10 years, with a mark of 209-80 (.723).

So what's the big emphasis on winning, since it's a subject that UNLV basketball fans have become quite used to.

Well, it seems that in 1980-81, UNLV was 'only' 16-12. Now for most college programs across the country, 16-12 is a good season. But at UNLV, from Tarkanian all the way down to the corner drugstore, 1980-81 was not a successful season for the Runnin' Rebels. It was also the first time in Tark's illustrious major college career that his team did not win 20 or more games.

So 1981-82 is a rebuilding year of sorts for UNLV, not from the talent standpoint — because there's a lot of it that will be playing for the Scarlet and Gray this season, but from the standpoint of winning, winning the Tarkanian way, which means 20 or more victories in a season.

UNLV returns its top six scorers from last season, along with four other lettermen. And to make the cupboard even more stocked, Tark's recruiting season netted five very talented basketball players.

The top scorers who return are — 6-6 junior Larry Anderson (15.5 ppg), 6-9 junior Sidney Green (15.0, 10.9 rpg), 6-8 senior Michael Johnson (13.5, 7.7), 6-2 junior Greg Goorjian (12.3), 6-6 senior Michael Burns (11.0) and 6-6 senior Richard Box (9.2). All these players, led by Green — who earned some All American honors as a freshman in 1980 — have started for UNLV during parts of their career and both Box and Burns have started for the last three seasons.

Also returning for UNLV this year after missing all of 1980-81 is 5-9 junior Michael Loyd. Loyd missed all of last season with a broken neck suffered in an automobile accident last September. He has fully recovered and after

appearing in 59 games from 1978-80, his return is greatly welcomed.

UNLV's other lettermen returning for 1981-82 are — 6-9 senior John Copeland, 6-3 sophomore Derrick Giles and 6-7 senior Ed Pawlak.

Competition is what Tarkanian wanted on this season's squad and competition is what he'll get with the addition of UNLV's five new recruits.

Oldest of the new bunch is 6-9 junior Ken Lyles, who transferred to UNLV from Dixie Junior College. A former prep standout at Basic High School in Henderson, Nev., Lyles averaged 15.1 points and 9.3 rebounds a game in 1981.

Next are the two sophs, 6-9 Richie Adams and a teammate of Lyles' at Dixie, 6-2 Danny Tarkanian, Jerry's son. Adams, a star at New York City's Ben Franklin High School, came to UNLV from Massachusetts Bay Community College, where he averaged 27 points, 15 rebounds and an amazing 10 blocked shots a game.

Tarkanian, who was an All State quarterback and point guard at Las Vegas' Bishop Gorman High school, averaged 14.4 points and 6.7 assists a game at Dixie last season.

The Rebels most heralded recruit for this season is 6-4 freshman guard Dwayne Polee. Polee, who averaged 32.2 points a game at Los Angeles' Manual Arts High School and led his club to a 24-1 record, was the 1981 LA Player of the Year, beating out

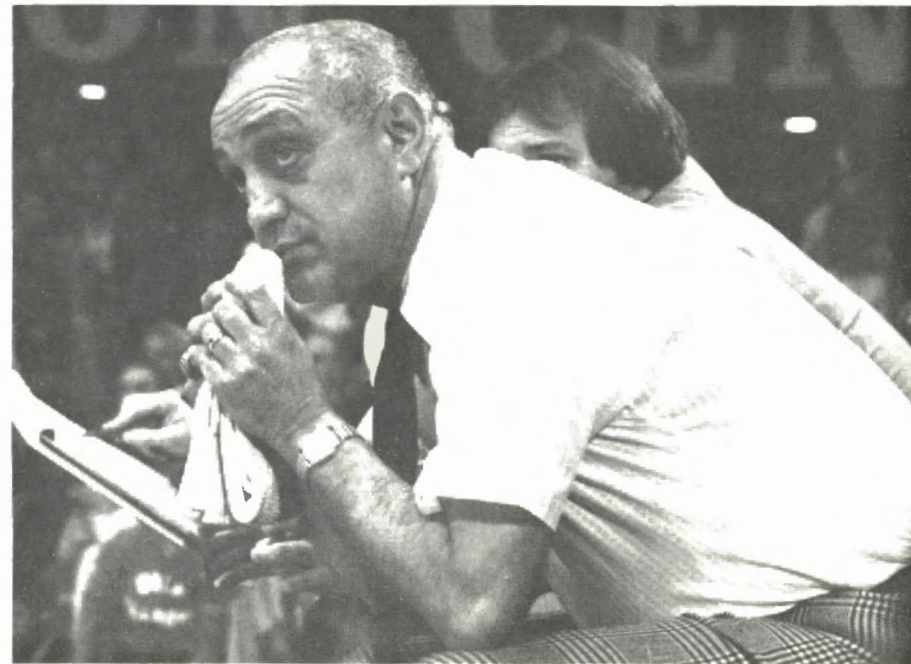
Stuart Gray, the 7-footer now playing at UCLA.

UNLV's final recruit is 5-5 mighty-mite Leroy Byrd, who prepped at Bryan Station in Lexington, KY. In 1981, he averaged 14.0 points, 7.0 steals and 8.0 assists a game.

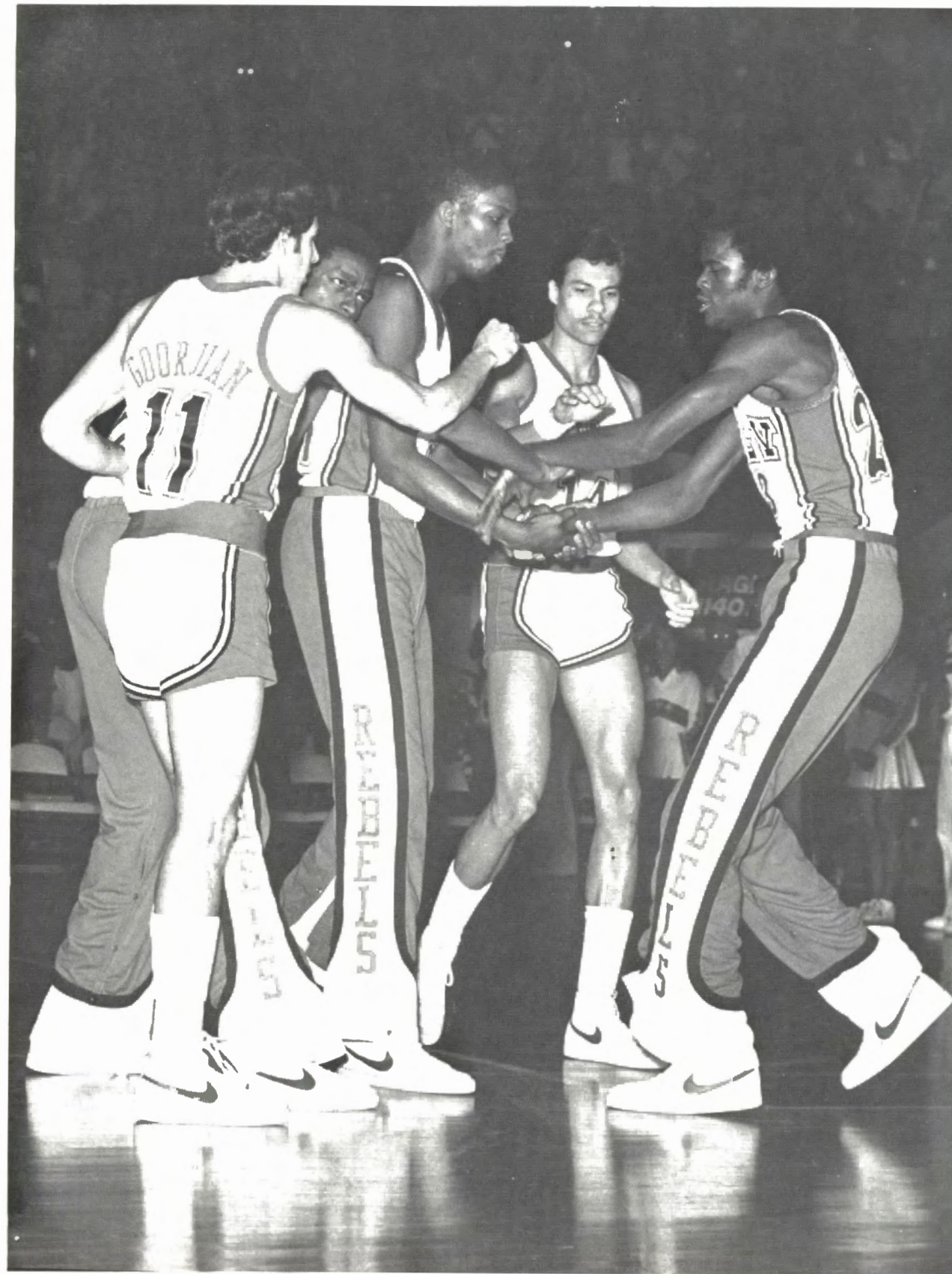
Not only are there new players, but there's also a new addition to Tark's staff. He's Tate Locke, former head coach of the Buffalo Braves and college coach at Army, Miami of Ohio, Clemson and Jacksonville. He'll be UNLV's new parttime assistant, joining Runnin' Rebel staffers Tim Grgurich, Mark Warkentien and Denny Hovanec.

The schedule for 1981-82 is nothing to laugh at. Playing these opponents would give any coach gray hair — even Tarkanian. Louisiana State, San Diego State, Wyoming, Long Beach State, Brigham Young and New Mexico all visit Las Vegas this year and on the road, the Runnin' Rebels will face Arizona, BYU, Cal-Irvine, Georgetown at Landover, Md., Kansas St., New Mexico, Utah, Seton Hall at Madison Square Garden, Hawaii, San Diego St., Iona at the Meadowlands and South Carolina.

So UNLV in 1981-82 has the coach and his staff, the veterans, the rookies and the schedule. And if the Runnin' Rebels are fortunate enough to win 20 or more games this season, then it will be the type of year made to order for one man and his name is Jerry Tarkanian.

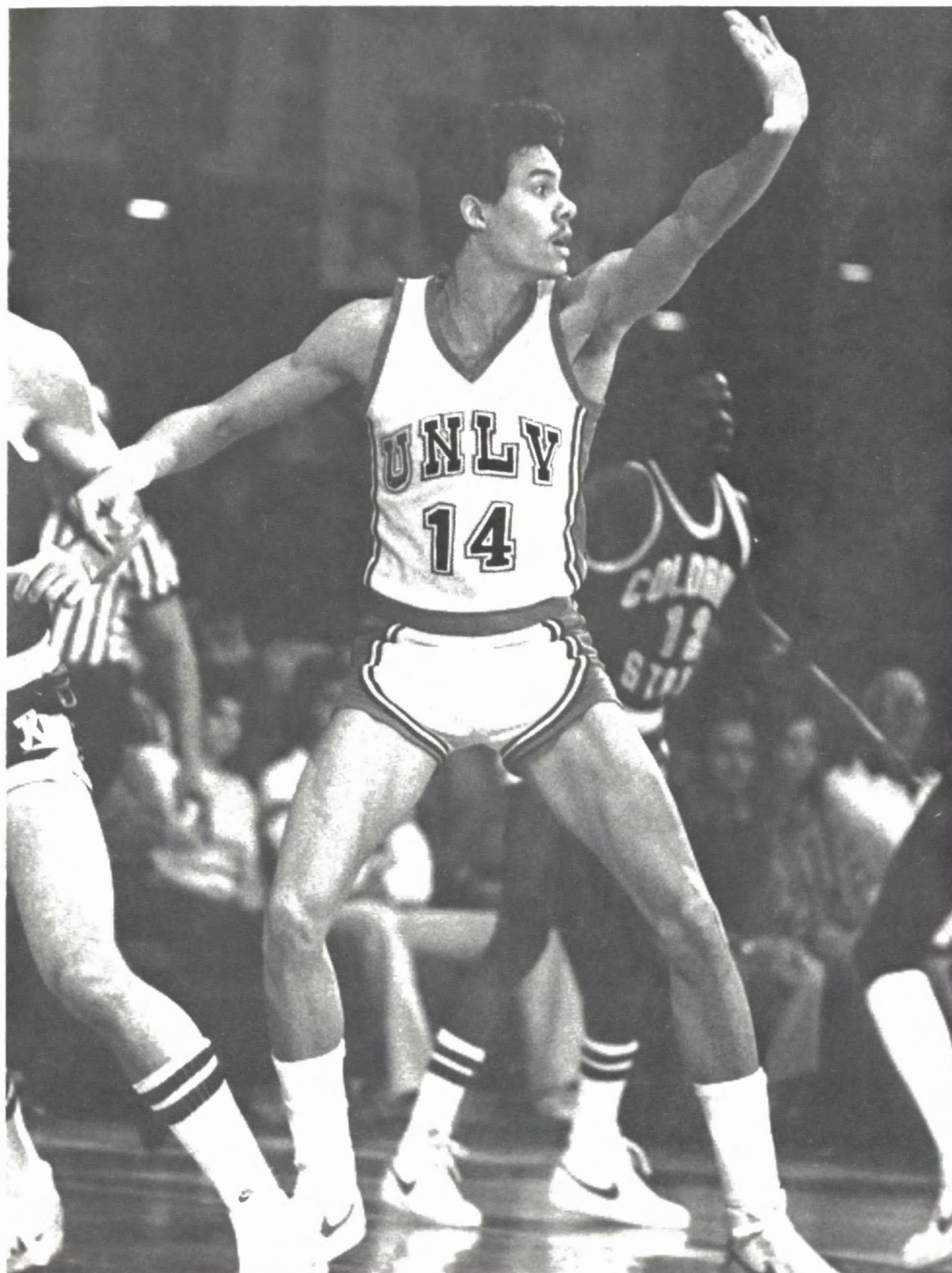

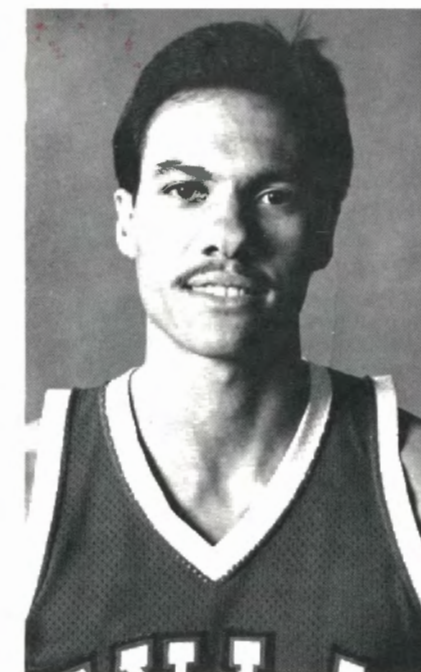
AT UNLV

1981-82 — Richard Box will assume his same role this season as in the past three years at UNLV. He's been a starter on and off for the last three campaigns at a forward spot. "He's a solid player who works hard," Rebel head coach Jerry Tarkanian said. "He's a good athlete whose potential is invaluable to us. He can do so many things well — put the ball on the floor, run, jump and he's a fine scorer."

1980-81 — As a junior, Box was a co-captain last season, along with Michael Burns. In 28 games, he started 23. Box averaged 9.2 points and 5.3 rebounds a contest and was credited with 23 steals and 69 assists. He played 876 minutes. His bests in 1980-81 were 16 points scored against West Texas State on Dec. 23 and

Mississippi State on Dec. 29. His top rebounding mark last season was 12, against Brigham Young, on Feb. 6.

1979-80 — As a sophomore, Box appeared in 32 games and averaged 10.8 points and 7.1 rebounds a game and was credited with 53 assists. His bests were 25 points against Pan American to open the season and his top rebounding mark was 16, against U.S. International University. In 1979-80, the Rebels were 23-9 and finished fourth in the NIT and Box was fourth on that team in scoring and third in rebounding. In his sophomore campaign, he scored in double figures 19 times and had double rebounding marks on seven occasions. The summer following his sophomore campaign, Box was invited and did participate in

1978-79 — As a frosh, Box appeared in 29 games and averaged 6.2 points and 4.1 rebounds a game. He was also credited with 17 assists. He played 477 minutes and had 10 steals. He led the team in rebounding twice, against San Diego State (14) and Colorado State (11).

UNLV Records — Box is 28th on the All Time UNLV scoring chart, with 784 points.

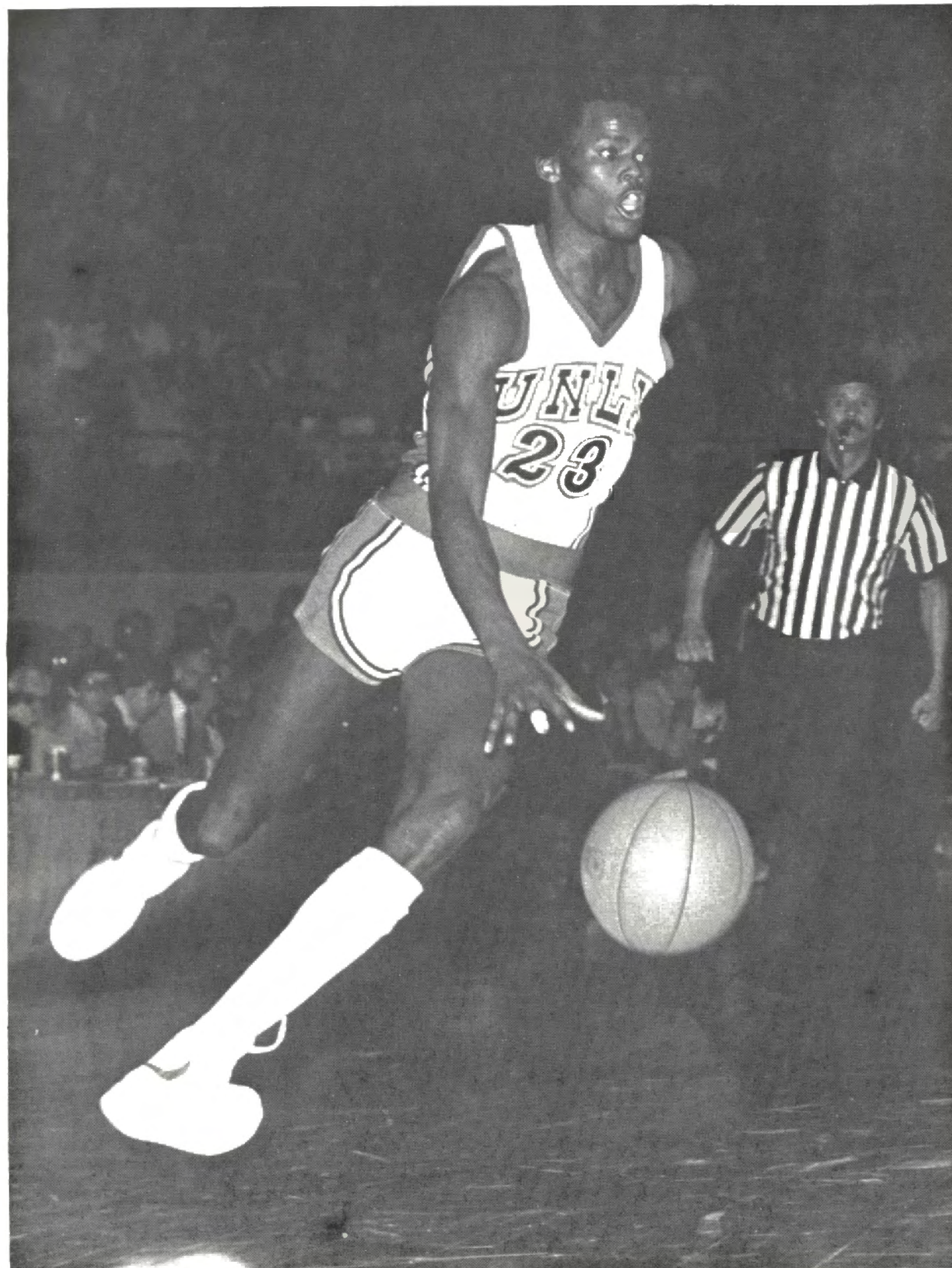
1975-78 — As a senior under coach Gene Hughes, Box averaged 23.2 points and 8.9 rebounds a game. He shot .580 from the field and his 42 points in one game was his prep career high. Following his senior season, he was selected as the California Interscholastic Federation 3-A Player of the Year. He was also All Freeway League and All Riverside County and played in the Houston Roundball Classic, the Wendy's Classic in Albuquerque, the Basketball Congress International All Star Game in Phoenix and the Sunkist Classic in Oakland during the summer of 1978. He graduated from North High School with a 3.2 grade point average.

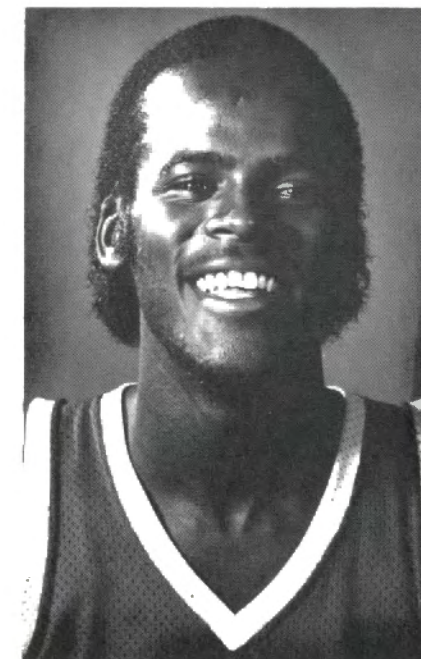
AT UNLV

1981-82 — As a senior, Michael Burns will be playing where he played as a frosh and soph, inside or at a wing position. Like Richard Box, Burns has been a starter on and off for the last three seasons. "We're going to move Michael back inside this year," UNLV Head Coach Jerry Tarkanian said. "He'll be more comfortable there. He's certainly one of our top scorers."

1980-81 — As a junior, Burns played guard and was a Rebel co-captain, with Richard Box. Last year, he started 21

of 27 games and was credited with 168 assists and 38 steals, both top marks on the squad. His bests for last season were 22 points against Wyoming on Jan. 27 and 15 rebounds vs. Oklahoma City on Dec. 22. Burns was slowed by an ankle injury during the middle of the 1980-81 campaign.

1979-80 — As a sophomore, he played in 32 games and averaged 14.2 points and 7.3 rebounds a game. He was also credited with 89 assists and 35 steals. His bests that year were 30

points against Loyola Marymount and 14 rebounds on three different occasions. His points and rebounds average were second on the team and he scored in double figures in 23 games.

1978-79 — As a freshman, Burns averaged 10.1 points and 6.3 rebounds for 29 games. He was also credited with 32 assists. His highs were 21 points against San Francisco and 14 rebounds vs. Marquette on regional TV. Sixteen times he scored in double figures.

UNLV Records — Against Hawaii on Feb. 21, 1981, Burns set the school mark for assists with 18. He is the 11th All-Time Scorer in UNLV history with 1,045 points.

AT CHAPPARAL HIGH SCHOOL

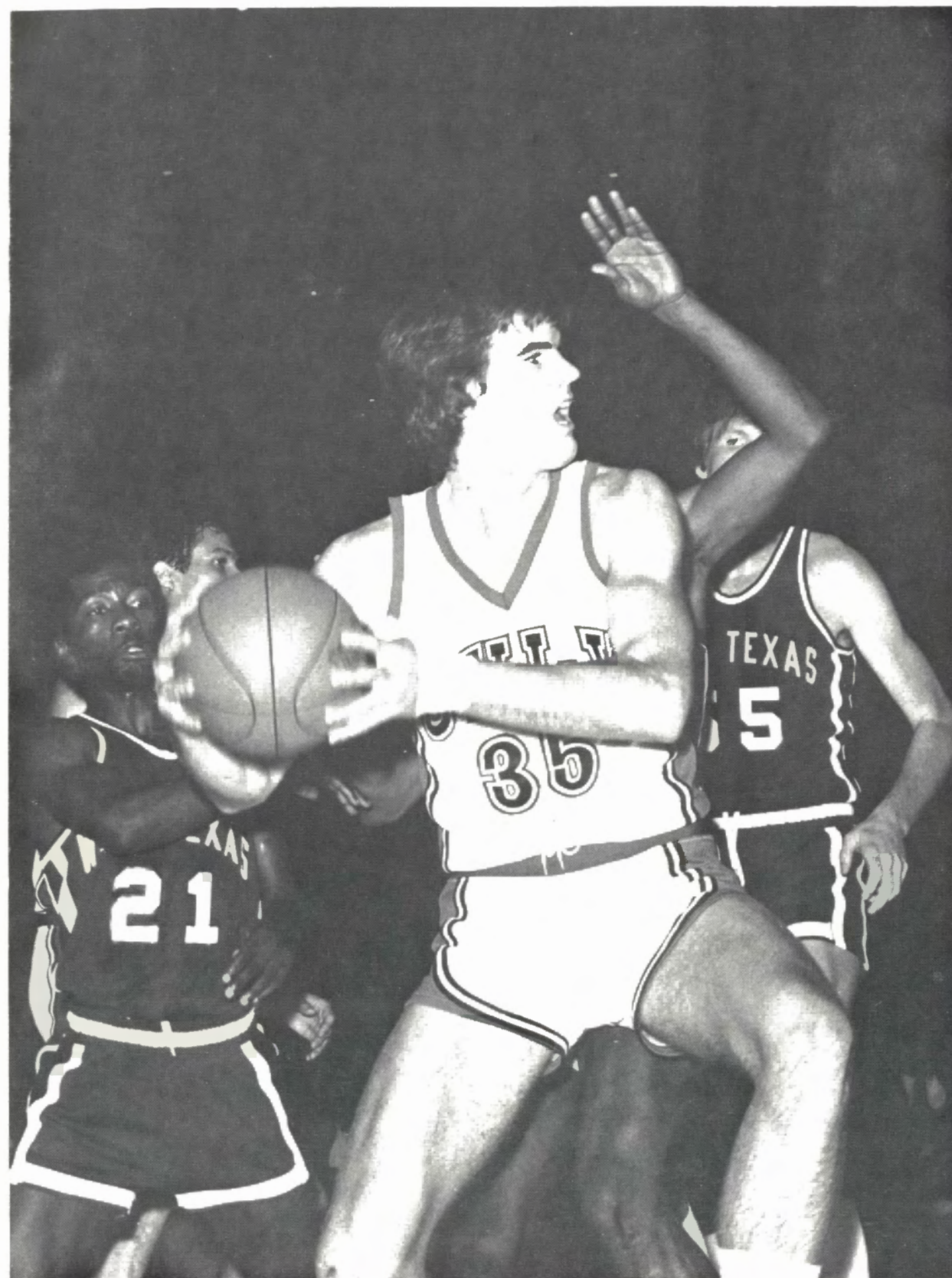

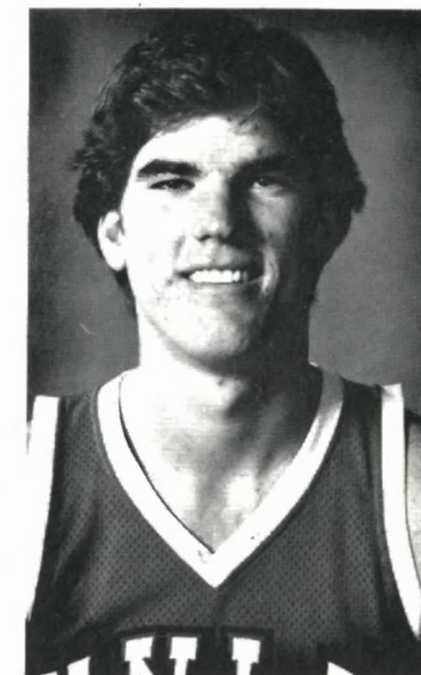
second team All-Conference and was a two-year letterman. Also at Mt. San Antonio he was on the Dean's List with a 3.3 grade-point average.

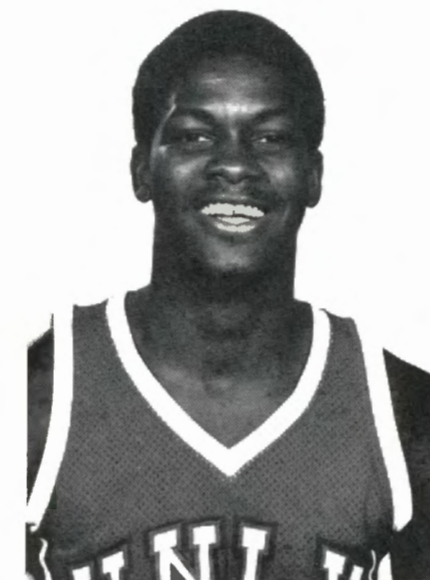
AT UNLV

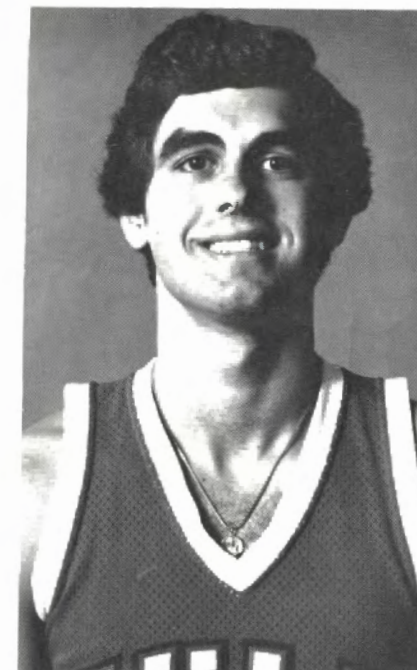

Jerry Tarkanian Head Coach



Entering his ninth season as Head Coach of the Runnin' Rebels, Jerry Tarkanian, the winningest all-time major college coach in America, looks forward to one of the most talented UNLV squads ever. Last season's young team was the first Rebel squad under Tarkanian failing to win 20 games, despite a respectable 16-12 record. With every starter returning from last year and an excellent recruiting season, the "Shark" should once again put on the most exciting show in Las Vegas.

Excitement is a trademark of Tarkanian's Rebels. In eight seasons at UNLV, Tarkanian's teams compiled records of 20-6, 24-5, 29-2, 29-3, 20-8, 21-8, 23-9 and 16-12. Tarkanian's Rebels hold 15 NCAA all-time records including an amazing 110.5 points per game average in 1975-76, and 164 points in one game (Hawaii-Hilo) during that same season.

Four times under Tarkanian's command the Rebels have gone on to the NCAA and NIT post-season tournaments, finishing third in the NCAA in '76-77, defeating the University of North Carolina-Charlotte 106-94 in the consolation game. In 1980, UNLV placed in the prestigious NIT's final four. Two other times, in '74-'75 and '75-'76, the Rebels were invited to the NCAA post-season classic. UNLV holds a 7-3 post-season record. The 1976-77 Rebels set six NCAA post-season marks, including most points in a 5-game series (505), most field goals in a five game series (218), most points in one game (121 vs. U. of San Francisco), most points, two teams (200 vs. UNCC), most field goals made, two teams (83 vs. UNCC) and most points by one team in a consolation championship (106 vs. UNCC).

After that historic 1976-77 season, UNLV finished fourth in the final Associated Press poll, sixth in the United Press International poll and third in the Basketball Weekly poll. In 1975-76, UNLV won its first 23 games, ended at 29-2 with a lofty third place rating in the Associated Press poll.

Winning is something synonymous with Tarkanian's name. In 20 seasons on the college level, he has posted an outstanding 516-97 record overall and is 182-53 at UNLV. At all three stops on the collegiate level, Riverside City College, Long Beach State and UNLV, Tarkanian turned programs which never tasted championship seasons, into perennial winners. While at Long Beach, Tarkanian's 49ers NEVER lost a home game in five seasons, rattling on 65 straight wins, culminating with an impressive 77-66 nationally-televised win over Marquette in 1973.

At UNLV, Tark's troops have been nearly as impressive with a 182-53 record in eight seasons in the Las Vegas Convention Center, including a 72-game streak at one point, which is the longest in recent NCAA vintage.

On Runnin' Rebel game nights, the otherwise stately convention hall is turned into a mass of theatrical light explosions which quickly work the crowd into a frenzy — that's why a prominently-placed sign entreats visitors with "Welcome to Tark's Shark Tank."

The only two teams who dared to defeat the Runnin' Rebels in the 1973-74 season at home were Texas Tech, 82-76, and the University of Houston, 75-72. The Runnin' Rebels avenged the Houston loss in 1976 beating the Cougars in the opening round of the Holiday Classic, 116-92.

In 1977-78, the University of New Mexico snapped UNLV's 72-game win streak on Jan. 7, with a 102-98 win. Portland State also trimmed the Runnin' Rebels by a 89-84 score.

In 1978-79 three teams got out of Las Vegas as winners — Temple University, 89-79, New Mexico again, 102-99, and San Diego State 94-91.

In the 1979-80 season, Pan American, Texas A & M, Weber State and Kentucky left Las Vegas as winners.

In NCAA playoff action after the 1974-75 regular season, the Rebels played a sub-regional game on the campus of Arizona State, defeating San Diego State 90-80. In the NCAA Regional tournament in Portland, Oregon, the Rebels were narrowly defeated by Arizona State, 84-81, but bounced back to capture the consolation title by defeating a favored University of Montana team, 76-67.

Following the 1975-76 regular season campaign, the Runnin' Rebels emerged and defeated Boise State, 103-78, in a sub-regional game played on the campus of the University of Oregon in Eugene. Then the Runnin' Rebels were knocked out of the race for the national championship, losing to the University of Arizona, 114-109, in overtime, at fabled Pauley Pavilion on the UCLA campus.

Before Long Beach State, where Tarkanian's coaching reputation first drew national acclaim, he spent seven seasons in the junior college ranks at Riverside and Pasadena City Colleges. At Riverside (1962-66), he had a 131-9 overall record, which included three consecutive state championships and four league titles in five years. No other junior college coach in the history of California basketball has achieved those heights. At Pasadena (1966-68), Tarkanian was 67-4 and bagged a fourth

state title while finishing in the runner-up spot his other year.

An astonishing feature of his wins is that they have been accomplished at schools which had never previously won a basketball championship. Riverside was last in its conference for two straight years before Tarkanian; Pasadena was last in its conference the previous year; Long Beach State had never won a championship; and UNLV had never finished higher than fourth in the WCAC.

The outstanding coach started his coaching career with five years in California high schools; San Joaquin Memorial, Antelope Valley and Redlands.

Regarded as one of the great recruiters in the nation, "The Pied Piper of College Basketball" landed for Long Beach State such nationally recognized superstars as Sam Robinson, George Trapp, Chick Terry, Ed Ratleff, Leonard Gray, and Roscoe Pondexter. In his first year at UNLV, Tarkanian may have recruited as well as he did during his entire tenure at Long Beach State.

As his winning tradition continues to grow, so does his reputation. Seven years ago, Tarkanian brought three high school All-American performers with him. They were Eddie Owens (Houston, Texas), Lewis Brown and Jackie Robinson (both from Los Angeles).

Seven years ago he recruited Robert Smith (Los Angeles), six years ago he brought Sam Smith (Las Vegas) and Reggie Theus (Inglewood, California), five years ago he brought in all-star junior college center Larry Moffett (Gary, Indiana), four years ago Earl Evans came to Las Vegas from Port Arthur, Texas and three years ago another host of young talent included Richard Box (Riverside, CA) and Michael Burns (Las Vegas).

In 1979-80, three more high school All-American players were added to the UNLV roster by Tarkanian in the 1979 New York City Player-of-the-Year Sidney Green, the 1979 Pittsburgh Player-of-the-Year Larry Anderson and the 1978 Los Angeles Player-of-the-Year Michael Johnson.

This recruiting year found Tark's son, Danny, coming to play at UNLV. Also, the Los Angeles Player-of-the-year Dwayne Polee was recruited by Tarkanian. Intimidating junior college shot-blocker Richie Adams, local product Kenny Lyles and Leroy Byrd were sold on UNLV by Tark's recruiting efforts.

Jerry Tarkanian is a towel-chewing, nail-biting, hard-working Armenian who came to Las Vegas with a commitment to excellence as his inspiring philosophy. He will settle for nothing less than excellence from his players, both on and off the court. In addition to a nationally recognized basketball program for UNLV, Tarkanian has developed a tutorial program for his players that has paid high dividends. UNLV attempts to emphasize equally the importance of academics and basketball to all student athletes.

Evidence of his strong belief in academics was his selection as "Professor of the Year" in 1966 by Riverside County for his "guidance and care on and off the court of all the young men under his tutelage, as well as his family of four."

Tarkanian's players have gone on to play in professional basketball. They include

Chuck Terry (Houston Rockets), Eric McWilliams (Houston Rockets), George Trapp (Detroit Pistons), Bob Rule (Cleveland Cavaliers), Ed Ratleff (Houston Rockets), John Q. Trapp (Los Angeles Lakers), Glenn MacDonald (Boston Celtics) and Leonard Gray (Seattle Supersonics). At UNLV, Ricky Sobers (Chicago Bulls, Glen Gondrezick (Denver Nuggets), Robert Smith (New Jersey Nets), Reggie Theus (Chicago Bulls), Larry Moffett (Houston Rockets), Eddie Owens (Buffalo Braves), Jackie Robinson (Seattle Supersonics), Sam Smith (Chicago Bulls), Brett Vroman (Utah Jazz), and Earl Evans (Detroit Pistons) have all played in the NBA. Sobers, Robert Smith, Theus, Gondrezick and Vroman are still on active status.

In eight years as the UNLV head coach, 16 players have been drafted by the NBA and a NCAA and pro-basketball record of six following the 1976-77 season.

An intense individual, Tark has coached in Ecuador for the People-to-People Sports Committee and in April and May of 1968, he coached the Junior College Olympic Team in the Olympic trials.

The 51-year-old coach easily won the hearts of Las Vegas fans and the Los Angeles Times called him an "instant Las Vegas celebrity."



A native of Euclid, Ohio, Tarkanian attended Pasadena City College before graduating from Fresno State in 1955. He received his Master's degree from Redlands University in 1960.

Tarkanian and his ever-active and totally-involved wife, Lois, reside with their four children — Pamela, Jodie, Danny and George, in their sparkling Las Vegas home in the Charleston Heights area of town.

With Tarkanian's traditional and colorful image, invitations for him to speak at clinics and banquets arrive almost daily. He will average nearly one per week during the off season, sending him virtually all over the country.

Following the 1976-77 season, Tarkanian was selected by the Medalist Industry as the "College Coach of the Year."

His first attempt at the movies is entitled, "The Fish That Saved Pittsburgh," and stars Dr. "J" Julius Irving and Tarkanian has a small part on film as well as having had a big part as a technical director behind the Lori-Mar production.

He is featured speaker for another season at the weekly meeting of the Rebel Quarter-back Club and he again has his Sunday weekly television show which airs on KVBC-TV, Channel 3.

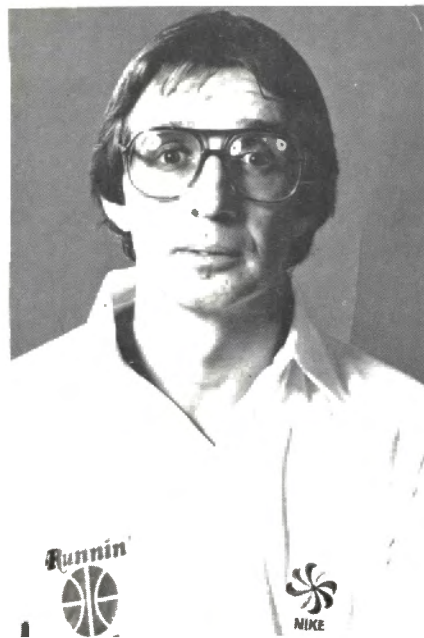

Tim Grgurich Assistant Coach



Tim Grgurich begins his second year as an assistant to Head Coach Jerry Tarkanian. The 38-year-old comes to the Rebels after a five-year stint as head coach at the University of Pittsburgh, where his Panthers compiled a 71-70 record, including 52-30 over the last three seasons.

Before that, the Pittsburgh native tenured as an assistant for the Panthers for 11 seasons and coached the freshman squad to an impressive 93-33 record.

Tarkanian is pleased with Grgurich's addition to the Rebel staff, adding, "Tim has a great deal of excellent experience and energy to add to our program, and should be a great asset to a recruiting network, especially on the East Coast."

Grgurich is a graduate of the University of Pittsburgh, with a bachelor and masters in Education. Until 1968, he was an assistant under Panther Head Coach Buzz Ridl.

Married, with two children, Grgurich graduated from Central Catholic High

School in Pittsburgh in 1960 and he also spent six years in the United States Marine Corp reserve.

At 38, Grgurich has had an active athletic life, not only as a coach, but as an athlete as well. He was a three-year letterman in basketball and baseball in high school and was also a three-year letter winner in basketball and baseball as an undergraduate at the University of Pittsburgh.

Among his coaching honors are being selected the Pittsburgh Basketball Writers Coach-of-the-Year in 1975-76, 1977-78, and 1978-79.

While head coach for Pitt, he was very instrumental in establishing academic support programs for his players and since 1960, the year he entered Pitt, 87 per cent of Pitt basketball teams have graduated.

Coach Tarkanian has indicated Grgurich will be working with academics here too. Grgurich replaced George McQuam who left to become the head coach at Cal State, Fullerton.

Mark Warkentien Assistant Coach



Hard-working Mark Warkentien starts on his second season as assistant coach for the Runnin' Rebels. The 28-year-old heads up the Rebel recruiting program and in his short time on the coaching level, he has acquired an excellent reputation as both a top recruiter and teacher.

Warkentien comes to UNLV after a short five-month stint as the assistant at the University of California-Irvine. In that short time, however, Warkentien developed a recruiting program rated as high as 10th in the nation by some polls. Before his brief stay with the Anteaters, he spent the 1978-79 and 1979-80 seasons as an assistant to Bobby Dye at Cal State-Fullerton.

He was also the head women's basketball coach at the University of California, Riverside during the 1977-78 season, was a part-time assistant at Saddleback Junior College from 1975-77 and a part-time assistant at Riverside City College from 1973-75.

His one season at UCR, the women's team compiled an 18-7 record. He is a 1976 graduate of Cal State Fullerton,

and played basketball at Ramona High School in Riverside, California and Riverside City College. The Ramona team his senior season finished 22-5 and won the Citrus Belt League championship. He was an All-Mission Conference pick following his 1971-72 season at Riverside City college under then head coach Bill Mulligan.

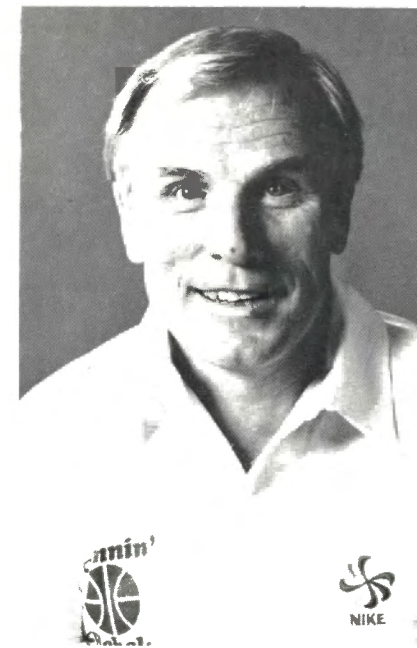
When Mulligan became head coach at Saddleback Junior College in 1975, Warkentien followed him there as an assistant, after having worked for two seasons with Mulligan at Riverside City College.

Warkentien, single, was born on April 16, 1953 in Huntington, Indiana.

Tarkanian is also a former Riverside City College coach, and, as head coach at RCC from 1962 through 1966, his teams compiled an amazing 141-9 record in four seasons, including a perfect 35-0 mark during the 1963-64 season.

At UNLV, Warkentien will be in charge of the academic side of the program, working with the Rebels and their tutors when necessary.

Tates Locke Part-Time Coach



Former NBA and veteran college coach, Tate Locke, has joined the Rebels as a part-time basketball coach for the 1981-82 season.

"We are real pleased to have Tate join our staff," admits ninth-year Runnin' Rebel head coach, Jerry Tarkanian, who has directed the program to a 182-53 record. "He is an outstanding coach, and he will be a tremendous asset to our program."

"I have thought highly of Tate for a long time," continues Tarkanian. "Five years ago when I considered the head coaching job with the Los Angeles Lakers, I had planned to take Tate as my assistant coach."

"As a part-time coach, he will be able to do everything but recruit for our program," the UNLV mentor adds. "He will coach on the floor and scout."

The 44-year-old Locke comes to UNLV from Jacksonville University, where his squads posted 47 wins against 39 wins in three seasons. He was voted the Sun Belt Conference's "Coach of the Year" and twice received Florida Sportswriters' "Coach of the Year" honors.

Locke began his college coaching career in 1963 when he was selected

as the head coach at West Point at the age of 25. In two years, he guided the Cadets to a 40-15 mark and consecutive third-place NIT performances.

Leaving Army in 1966, he assumed the top coaching duties at Miami of Ohio, and proceeded to direct the Redskins to prominence in the Mid American Conference with a four-year 56-42 slate. The 1969 team was runner-up in the NCAA Regional, and he gained MAC "Coach of the Year" recognition.

Locke then moved to Clemson University, where his teams recorded winning seasons in 1974 (14-12) and 1975 (17-11). His final Tiger squad also was invited to the NIT.

Entering the professional ranks, Locke was an assistant to Jack Ramsey with the Buffalo Braves in 1975-76, and was appointed head coach the following year.

Returning to the collegiate ranks, he assumed the coaching reins at Jacksonville in March, 1978.

In all, Locke has compiled a career record of 197-147, and seven of his 13 teams ended their regular season with post-season invitations — five in the NIT and two in NCAA tournaments.

Denny Hovanec Volunteer Coach



Denny Hovanec is the final addition to the Rebel coaching staff, after "walking on" prior to last season in hopes of furthering his knowledge of the game of basketball. Hovanec brings a great amount of time and energy to the Rebels and puts in a "head coaches day" every day, whether at the office or in the gym with the team.

He came to UNLV after spending the 1979-80 season as a part-time coach with Kent State University in Ohio.

Hovanec, 29, has a 32-11 record as a high school head coach. He went to Kent State last year from Youngstown North High School, where he led the Bulldogs to a 13-7 record in 1978-79 and a second place finish behind Class AA power Youngstown Rayen in Youngstown's tough City Series league.

Hovanec was also head coach of Centralia High School in Centralia, Kansas, posting a fine 19-4 record in 1976-77. He then joined the coaching staff at Woodrow Wilson High School in 1977 before accepting the position at North High School in 1978.

Born in Youngstown, Hovanec attended Wilson High School for three years, then transferred to Cardinal Mooney High School for his senior year. He was a starting forward on the Cardinals' 1969-70 team, and overall, he earned two varsity letters.

Hovanec attended Ohio State University for one year, transferred to Youngstown State for two years, then completed his studies at Emporia State University in Emporia, Kansas, graduating with a bachelor of science degree in social studies in 1975.

While at Youngstown State, he also played one season of basketball on the school's junior varsity team.

He has worked on the staffs of several coaching clinics, including the Bobby Knight camp at Indiana University and the Cardinal Mooney camp.

The Las Vegas Convention Center

Home of the Runnin' Rebels



UNLV plays all of its home games on one of the finest hardwood court arenas in the country—the 6,380 seat rotunda of the Las Vegas Convention Center. Capacity crowds cheer the Rebels in comfort in theatre-type cushioned seats. Ample parking is available at the conveniently located facility, one mile east of the fabulous Las Vegas "Strip".

Rather homey with its limited seating capacity, UNLV enjoys playing in its home facility and established an all-time UNLV record of winning 72 straight games before being defeated by the University of New Mexico on January 7, 1978 by a 102-98 score. Under head coach Jerry Tarkanian, the Runnin' Rebels have raced up and down the court for an impressive 126-16 record in the Convention Center the last eight seasons against Regular NCAA competition. This year, UNLV will play 15 games in the boisterous facility.

The sign hanging ominously over the rotunda floor reads, "Welcome to Tark's Shark Tank." It would more ap-

propriately read "Enter at your own risk." It is the Convention Center where the Runnin' Rebels earned their nickname. During the 1974-75, 1975-76, and 1976-77 seasons, the Runnin', Gunnin' Rebels did not lose a home game. In 1976-77, UNLV played 19 home games, scoring 2,109 points for an average of 111.0 per game. The fast-moving fleet-footed eagles of the hardwood soared to 100 or more points in 16 of those 19 games and in a pre-season exhibition game against the National Team of the Republic of China, UNLV actually pumped in 174 points in a 40-minute game.

Like its renown counterparts on the "Strip," the Convention Center "Showroom" has been virtually SOLD OUT for the past six years, with only very limited seating available for but a few games.

Some visiting coaches have vowed to never again return to the site of their most humiliating defeat.

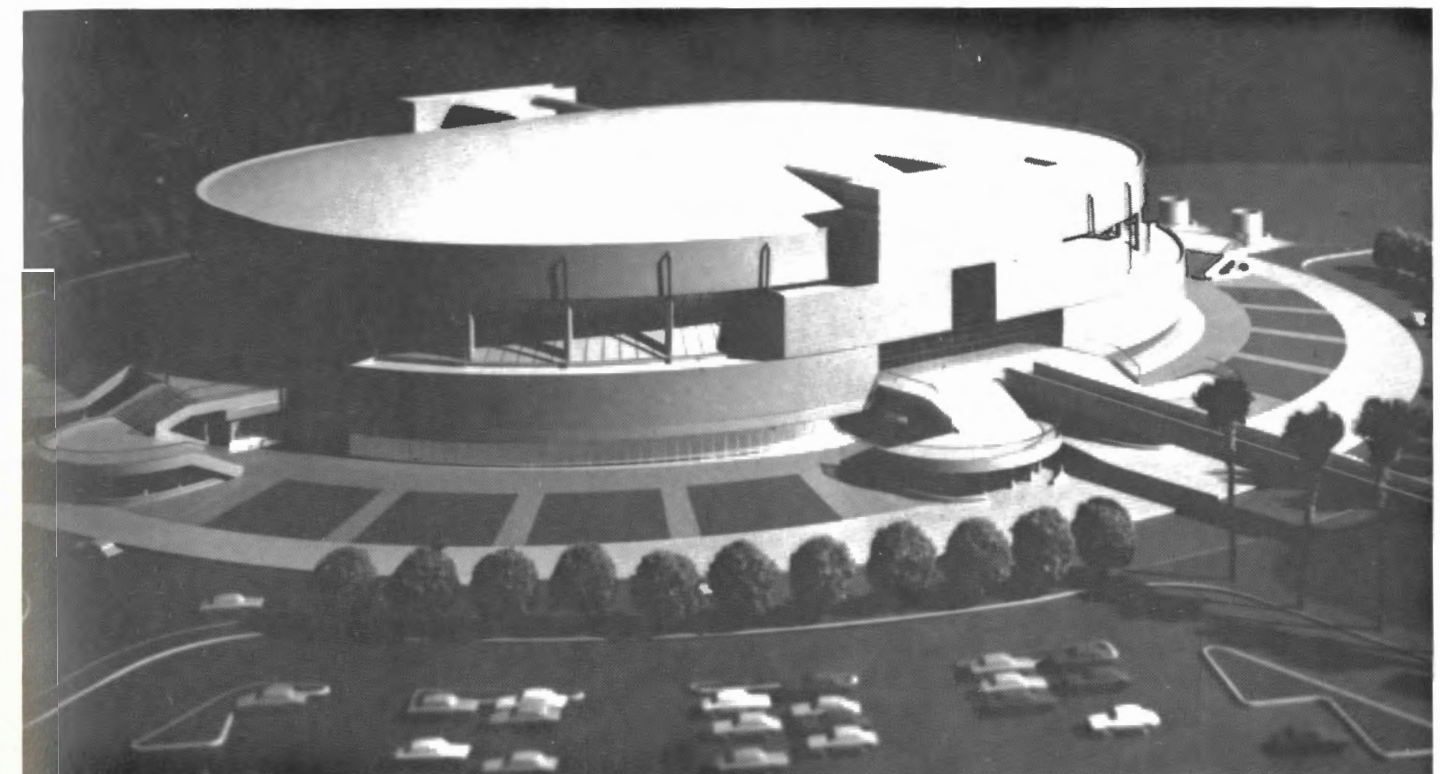
All visitors have left "Tark's Shark Tank" knowing they have just experienced something that will remain with them the rest of their lives.

W2C Architects, a partnership between Arturo B. Cambeiro-AIA, Domingo Cambeiro-AIA, and John Carl Warnecke, F.A.I.A. of Las Vegas have completed the bidding phase for the University of Nevada Thomas-Mack Center for Continuing Education and Special Events which includes a 18,000-seat sports arena and 90,000 square feet of additional functions — a restaurant, office space for facility management and athletics administration, and a

Center for Continuing Education. Thirty special VIP boxes at the concourse level provide for 392 private luxury seats. Parking will be available for 5500 cars.

The \$26,540,631 project has been funded by the State of Nevada for the University. A poured-in-place concrete structure with a clear span roof structure of two-way steel trusses, the entire building will be wrapped in a lightweight metal skin. Ground level offices and conference rooms are

banded in continuous double glazed reflective glass which maximize exterior views while meeting stringent energy goals. The upper seating level, by projecting over the last four rows of lower level seating improves sight lines, keeps all seating within a minimum distance from the playing surface reducing the volume and building cost.

The arena is scheduled for completion to open the 1983-84 basketball season.

Community Minded: The UNLV Basketball Alumni Association

Lonnie Wright has a dream. Ralph Piercy has a dream. Elbert Miller has a dream. These three former Rebel basketball players have big, big dreams.

They have all been college educated and they have all played for UNLV. They all want UNLV's basketball program to grow to its highest aspirations. But, unlike pipe dreams, these young guys are men of action. They want to help the former Rebels still be a part of the program, and, so, on February 17, 1978, after many hours of hard work and devotion, the UNLV Basketball Association was officially born into the UNLV athletic community and the city of Las Vegas.

"We want a lot of things," reflects Wright, founder and president of the group. "We want to provide a lasting attachment to the UNLV basketball program for the players. We also want to do things for the community and the current program. Our ideas, our hopes and dreams for this organization are much bigger than Lonnie Wright or any other single person. I am just a grain of sand to this organization and to UNLV basketball."

"What we want on the horizon is to help the community. That's why we have had these Community Roundball Classics.

The Classic, then, is for the community. Three years ago, stepping out on faith as it were on what the public's response to the organization and the game would be, the former Rebels played basically what would have to be considered an intra-squad game in the campus gym which can seat about

1,800 people comfortably. Well over 3,000 people jammed the nice, but definitely overcrowded gym to see a 113-103 rip-roaring, net-splitting basketball game with 23 Alumni participating.

Well, after the initial success of the Community Roundball Classic, the UNLV Basketball Alumni Association decided to give the community an even bigger spectacle two years ago, which in turn would provide more funds to help the youth in the area.

Everyone literally said it couldn't be done, but someone forgot to tell Lonnie Wright, and the rest of the Alumni Board.

The result was the Second Annual UNLV Community Roundball Classic which featured the UNLV Alumni team against a super-talented Alumni team from UCLA. It would mark the first time UNLV has ever competed against the mighty Bruins on the hardwood and to top it off, the game would be played in the Las Vegas Convention Center, the home court of Runnin' Rebel basketball. With a near-capacity crowd cheering UNLV on, the Runnin' Rebels stopped the Bruins cold, 155-134. But the real winners once again, were the youth of Las Vegas.

The proceeds of the game enabled the Basketball Alumni Association to hold numerous free clinics, as well as donate funds to local youth-oriented projects deemed appropriate by the Associations' Board of Directors.

Last year, the UNLV Basketball Alumni Association decided to go after another

well-known university to host for Community Roundball Classic III and the result, in overtime, was, The UNLV Runnin' Rebel Alumni 127, the University of Notre Dame Fighting Irish Alumni, 125. It was a great game played before over 4,000 fans in the Convention Center, but, once again...it was much more than just a game. The proceeds from the game went to fund the community-minded projects of the association during the 1980-81 academic year.

In last year's contest, the Alumni from Kentucky defeated the UNLV Alumni 127-125. It was a hotly contested game between two teams that dominated the game of basketball in the '70's.

The Basketball Alumni Association can speak in terms of alternatives. They know that only one percent of college players ever make it in the NBA. "Hey, Eddie Owens is on our board," reflects Wright. "He can sit down with youngsters, tell them he was an All-American for two years, and still didn't make it in the pros. He can help them realize the need for an alternative."

Noble ideas and pipe dreams have long been a major part of the American dream. The UNLV Basketball Alumni Association is not a dream, it is an alternative. One which is truly needed in today's society. They are doers and not just talkers.

Remember, some men see things the way they are and ask, Why? Others dream of things that never were, and, ask, Why Not?

DR. BRAD ROTHERMEL UNLV Athletic Director



The associate director and business manager of the department of intercollegiate athletics at the University of West Virginia was named UNLV athletic director.

Dr. Bradley L. Rothermel was selected from a list of four candidates who had been screened from a group of 50 applicants by a 15-member search committee.

Rothermel relieved Dr. Charles Bucher, a UNLV physical education professor who had been acting athletic director.

Rothermel had been at the University of West Virginia for the past two years. Before that, he was assistant athletic director at Kansas State University, and had earlier been with the athletic department at the University of Illinois. With experience in two major conferences, the Big Eight while at Kansas State and the Big Ten at Illinois, while West Virginia is a major independent, Rothermel arrived on the UNLV scene highly qualified for the Rebels' AD position.

"Dr. Rothermel is especially well prepared, and has much experience in the business and budget areas," Goodall notes. "He has also been involved in development and fund raising

and carried major responsibilities for coordinating the department's involvement with construction of a new football stadium at West Virginia."

"These contacts should be helpful in future scheduling and in relations with other universities."

Rothermel, 43, was administrative associate and research consultant with the Chicago Cubs, 1963-65, and has coached baseball at the high school, collegiate and professional levels.

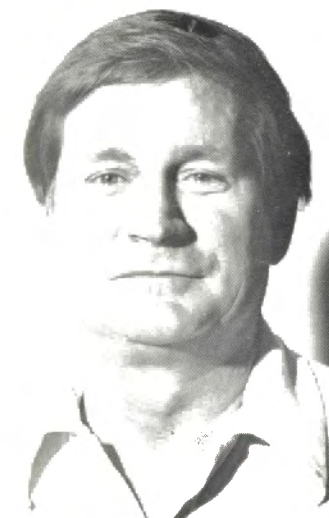
He was professor of continuing education and health education at Kansas State University, dean of the Division of Health and Physical Education at George Williams College in Illinois, and an associate and assistant professor of physical education at the University of Illinois.

Rothermel played semi-professional and professional baseball, semi-pro basketball and high school football.

He received his doctorate from the College of Applied Human Life Sciences, University of Illinois, in 1965, where he also completed his graduate work. Rothermel received the bachelor of science degree from the University of Illinois, Dekalb.

Married, he has two daughters.

WAYNE PEARSON Associate Athletic Director



Originally hired as the Director of Athletic Fund-Raising, Pearson still has the responsibilities of that position along with the more encompassing title of Associate.

In addition to seeing UNLV grow from virtually nothing to a thriving major college force in athletics, Pearson is the coordinator of the annual fund-raising program at UNLV which has brought in over \$1 million each of the last four years for the UNLV athletic program.

Born in East Ely, the 50-year-old Pearson was also the chairman of the ad hoc committee of the University Board of Regents whose function was to start a marching band for the UNLV athletic program. That committee started its function in December of 1977 and UNLV had its first-ever marching band last football season.

A strong man of action, Pearson's background is such that it continually draws tremendous interest from professional organizations around the country.

A graduate of White Pine High School in Ely, he received both his bachelor and Master of Arts degrees in General Psychology from the University of Nevada, Reno. He got his undergraduate degree in 1952 and his master's after serving two years in the U.S. Army in 1957.

Not complacent in any area of his life, he continued his education and obtained his doctorate in Educational Psychology and Measurement from Cornell University in New York in 1960.

His employment history clearly shows the diverse and complex capabilities of this intriguing UNLV stalwart. In addition to numerous research projects with emphasis on statistics, testing, sampling theory, probability theory and research design, Pearson was also the State Executive Director of the Nevada Republican Central Committee from 1963-66, and a member of the Nevada State Gaming Control Board from 1967-69.

Currently his energies flow in many directions and all quite successfully. In addition to his superbly fulfilled roles within the UNLV athletic framework, Pearson is also the sole proprietor of Nevada Research Consultants, specializing in Market Research, business surveys, public opinion surveys, special consulting to advertising agencies and business firms.

He is also a member of the board of directors of the Dunes Hotel and Casinos Corporation which operates the Dunes Hotel in Las Vegas.

A member of the Phi Kappa Phi national academic honor society, Pearson has been one of the five-person board of Psychological Examiners for the state of Nevada since he was first appointed by then Governor Paul Laxalt in 1970.

A past president of the Nevada Psychological Association, Pearson is one of the more dynamic members of the UNLV athletic family.

DENNIS FINFROCK Assistant Athletic Director



In his first full season as an assistant Athletic Director at UNLV is Dennis Finfrock, who from 1977-81 was the Rebels head wrestling coach.

Finfrock is in charge of team travel arrangements for the football and men's basketball teams along with working with the five-sport women's program and a variety of other administrative duties.

Under Finfrock's direction, the Rebel wrestling program was extremely successful. The inaugural season in 1976-77 resulted in an amazing 19-2 record. He has followed that with seasons of 16-9, 18-5 and 12-6 in dual matches in 1979-80. A big highlight of the 1979-80 season was defeating Western Athletic Conference Champion Brigham Young University, 22-21 in the final match of the regular season held here in Las Vegas.

He also hosted the 1980 NCAA Western Independent Regional championships as part of the National Championships which were held at the University of Oregon in Eugene last year.

His overall record at UNLV was 65-22, a very respectable winning percentage of .747, especially when you consider the strength of the schedules he always manages to line up.

A graduate of Brigham Young University, Finfrock has been involved in wrestling since 1963, and has helped promote high school wrestling in the Las Vegas area since 1970. He became an assistant coach at Rancho High School in 1970, and three years later he moved over to Chapparral High School to become head coach.

The intelligent 33-year-old father of one, graduated from BYU with a Bachelor of Science degree in zoology and minor degrees in botany and physical education.

CHRISTINA KUNZER Coordinator of Women's Athletics



In July of 1981, Christina Kunzer assumed responsibility for coordinating all women's athletic events, community fund raising, and representing the University at national and regional meetings as well as other related duties. She is the first to hold the job as Coordinator of Women's Athletics at UNLV.

"We feel we have a very qualified and extremely ambitious person in Tina," commented Athletic Director Dr. Brad Rothermel at the time of Kunzer's appointment. "She has the utmost support and encouragement from the University in her endeavors as Coordinator of Women's Athletics."

Finfrock was a Junior College Athletic Conference wrestling champion and doubled in football, where he was also first-team all-conference at defensive end. He was also named honorable mention to the All-Western Athletic Conference football team at BYU his senior year. Finfrock was an All-Academic team member by compiling a 3.7 grade-point average.

He received his Masters Degree in 1974 from Northern Arizona University, with emphasis in biology.

Locally, Finfrock has done as much to promote wrestling in the Las Vegas community as any one individual. He organized the Southern Nevada Wrestling Federation in 1973 to promote amateur wrestling in southern Nevada on all levels. Since that time, membership in the federation has grown to over 700 strong. Finfrock is also the Nevada State chairman of the United States Wrestling Federation.

Born in Dayton, Ohio, he was raised in Yuma, Arizona, where he met his wife, Kay, who is currently employed at KVBC-TV.

His son, Jason, 13, is already a veteran of youth sports programs. He has completed five years in both Little League baseball and Pop Warner football. But wrestling is, like his father, his main interest, and he has been at it since the age of four when he won his first tournament.

Kunzer, a native of Las Vegas, is a 1975 graduate of UNLV with a Bachelor's degree in Physical Education. She later earned a Masters in Education at UNLV in 1977.

Taking over as head coach of the UNLV women's tennis program in 1978, Kunzer became involved in several areas of the UNLV athletic program, including 2 years as a graduate assistant in the Physical Education Department from 1977 to 1979. She has served as cheerleader consultant since 1977 and continues to handle that job.

Kunzer is married to former UNLV football player Thomas Kunzer. In her spare time she enjoys dancing, snow skiing, horticulture, and slowpitch softball.

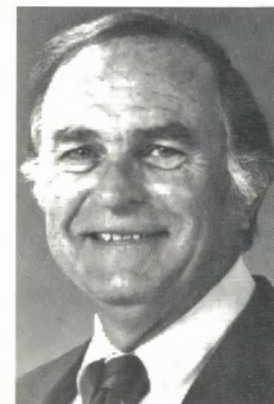

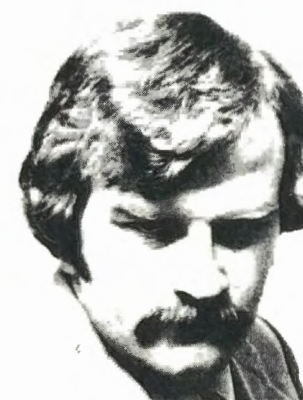

A Growing University

Las Vegas is known world-wide as an entertainment capital. But there is another side of the city which is gaining national recognition each year.

The University of Nevada, Las Vegas is a growing institution of higher learning. In less than ten years, UNLV has tripled its campus size, allowing room for the university's 63 different degree programs available to students, including over two dozen at the master's and doctoral levels.

Founded in 1957, UNLV has grown from a single one-story building in the desert to a green, 335-acre campus with a total head-count enrollment of approximately 10,000.

To accommodate the increasing enrollment, UNLV has undertaken a massive construction program which has brought millions of dollars worth of new buildings to the campus in the past decade.

These include one of the most modern teacher education facilities in the country, a major classroom and office building, a four-building physical education complex complete with a 50-meter indoor swimming pool, new laboratories and classrooms in the life sciences, and a spacious 2,000-seat concert hall which serves as a cultural home for the entire community.

A \$7 million, four-story addition to the James Dickinson Library opened in Fall 1981, providing better facilities and more room for the growing student body which requires expanded library holdings.

A generous gift from local attorney and businessman Artemus

W. Ham, Jr., has provided seed money for the new Alta Ham fine arts building, scheduled for completion in early 1982.

The \$4.2 million building will house teaching, research and studio facilities for the departments of theatre arts, music and art.

Ground was recently broken for a \$9 million facility to house both the College of Business and Economics and the College of Hotel Administration. Special features include enclosed patios and a kitchen and dining room for "hands-on" foodservice practice.

Ground has been broken on the 18,000-seat Thomas-Mack sports pavilion and continuing education complex. This building will serve as the new home for UNLV basketball in 1983.

There are more than 400 faculty at UNLV today. They come from distinguished centers of learning —

Berkeley, Harvard, Chicago, Princeton — and through their research and publications they are earning a fine academic reputation for UNLV in circles of higher education.

The College of Hotel Administration, for example, ranks among the finest programs of its type in the United States, and its graduates hold top management positions in hotels, restaurants and hospitals the world over.

The university's reputation in the sciences is growing, too, as it carries out research projects in such fields as desert ecology, environmental biology and geology,

taking full advantage of UNLV's unique Southwestern desert setting.

The UNLV theatre arts department continues to earn regional and national awards for its outstanding dramatic productions, and music students are now earning credits playing behind the superstars of show business on the Las Vegas Strip.

Over the past several years, the UNLV Jazz Ensemble has garnered numerous awards in international competition. The group has traveled in Switzerland, Poland, the Orient, and most recently toured South America.

The university also has a progressive teacher education program, a growing nursing department and solid preparation for students in the social sciences, the humanities, business and economics.

UNLV also reaches out into the community through its aggressive continuing education program that last year enrolled 16,000 local residents — from housewives to business owners, graduates to four-year-olds.

The future is bright for UNLV as it begins its 24th year of service to Nevada through teaching, research and public service.

Dr. Leonard Goodall President



Dr. Leonard "Pat" Goodall, UNLV's fourth president, stepped into the university's top administrative post in July, 1979 arriving at a time when the university is perhaps on the brink of its greatest period of development.

With an administrative background at three urban universities, he is especially suited to the job.

Dr. Goodall comes to Las Vegas from the midwest where he had served for eight years as Chancellor of the University of Michigan-Dearborn.

Previously, he served successively as associate dean of faculties and vice chancellor of the University of Illinois at Chicago Circle.

A specialist in the field of urban politics, Dr. Goodall predicts that higher education will flourish in the future in the nation's urban centers, especially in the Southwest where the population growth is greatest.

"I'm very excited about returning to this part of the country," he said

at the time of his appointment. "My wife, family and I loved our years in the Southwest."

From 1962 to 1967, Dr. Goodall worked as assistant director and later as director of the Bureau of Government Research at Arizona State University.

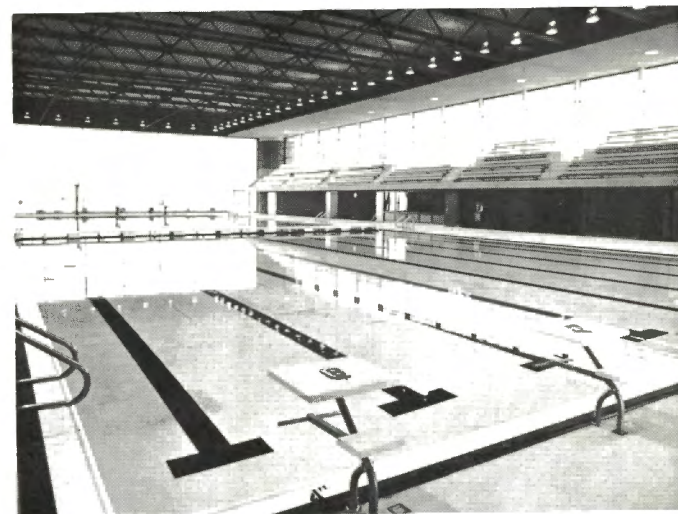
The administrator received his bachelor of arts degree in social science from Central Missouri State College in 1958. He earned his master of arts in political science from the University of Missouri in 1960, and a doctorate in political science from the University of Illinois in 1962.

Our cultural scene is enriched by art galleries, legitimate theatres, a professional ballet company and numerous serious musical organizations. When you live here, you soon realize that the glitter and glamour of the "Strip" is

usually left to the tourists; in all the other important ways, Las Vegas is no different than any large city on the move. The advantage is that if you want to take part in Las Vegas' unique entertainment scene, it's there.

For UNLV, this is the picturesque southwestern United States. Within a 30-mile radius lie the shores of Lake Mead, massive Hoover Dam and the Colorado River recreation area, the snow skiing trails of 12,000-foot Mount Charleston, and a panorama of red-rock mountains, eroded sandstone landscapes and forgotten ghost towns. The city is only 4 to 5 hours drive by car from Los Angeles, Phoenix or southern Utah's great national parks.

Las Vegas (Spanish for "The Meadows") is the seat of Clark County, located in the southern tip of Nevada, bordered by Arizona and the Colorado River on the east and California on the west. 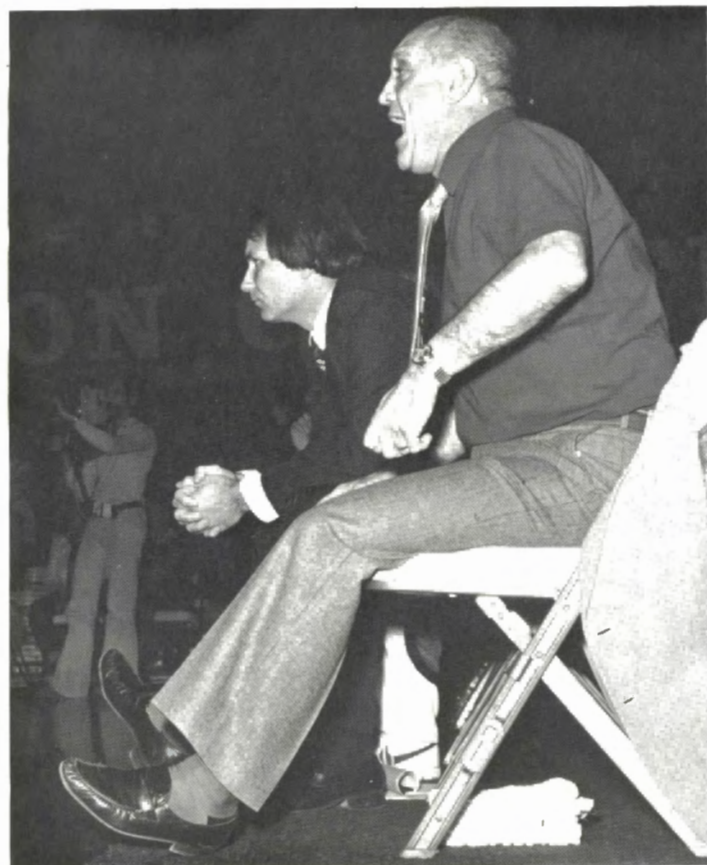

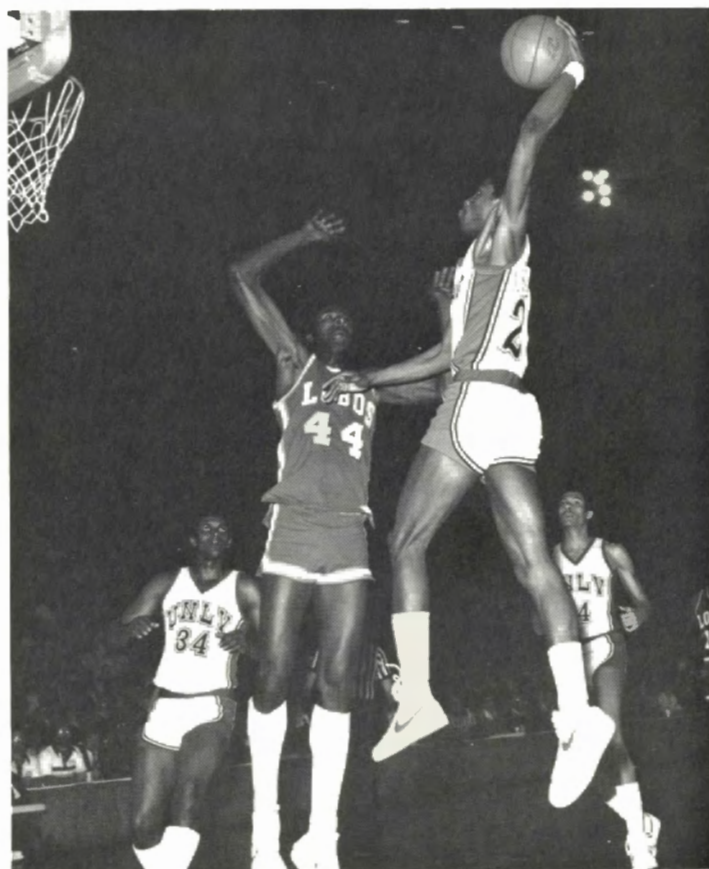

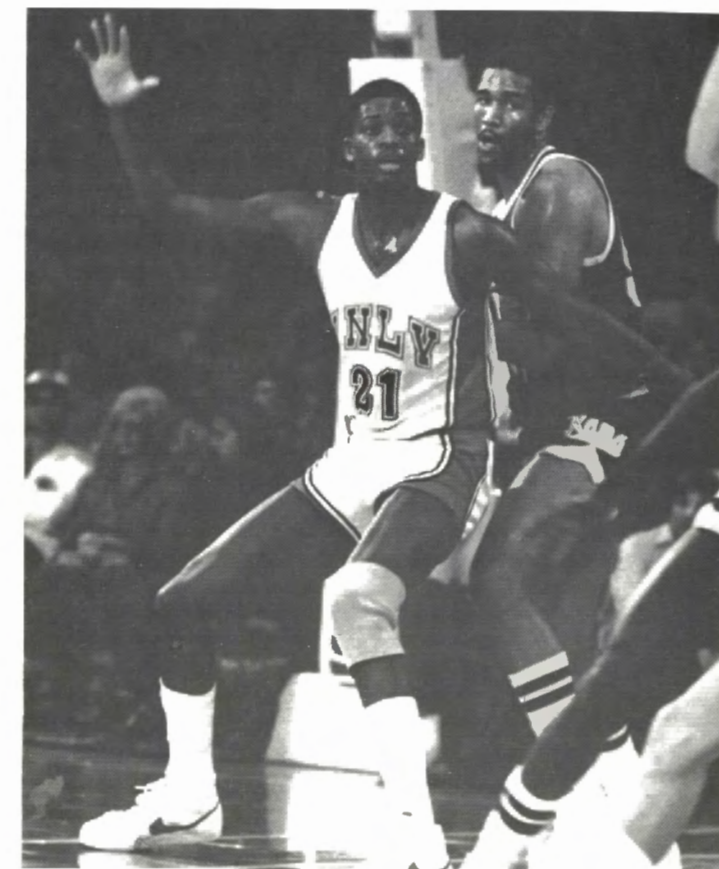


UNLV head basketball coach Jerry Tarkanian shouts, while volunteer assistant Denny Hovanec intently watches the Runnin' Rebels in action.

Larry Anderson, 6-6 junior from Pittsburgh, Pa., was UNLV's leading scorer last season with a 15.5 average.

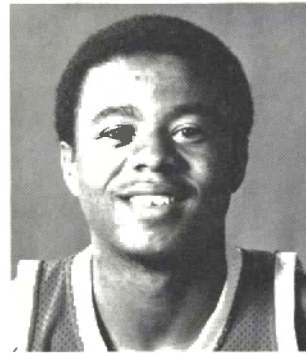

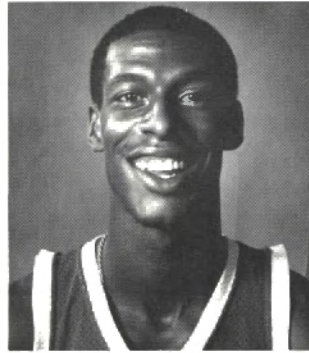
