Tonight's Game

Most Americans are well aware of Japanese imports...Toyota and Datsun cars, Sony TVs, Seiko watches...What they are not as familiar with is Japanese basketball, which Las Vegas sports fans will be seeing for the first time when Meiji University's team take to the floor of the Thomas & Mack Center tonight to meet the awesome strength of UNLV's Runnin' Rebels.

How does a game like this go from the drawing board to reality between schools located half-way around the world from each other?

Ironically, the Meiji vs UNLV basketball game was an off-shoot of Japan's national sport of sumo.

Sumo??

George Yoshinaga, a Japanese American entrepreneur, was in Las Vegas earlier this year, looking for a site to present sumo to local sports fans.

During his stay, he was introduced to UNLV's athletic director, Dr. Brad Rothermel by Line Davies, director of casino event for the Riviera Hotel during a lunch at the hotel.

There was some discussion about, perhaps, staging sumo at the Thomas & Mack but since Thomas & Mack is primarily known for its hosting of basketball games, the conversation turned to that sport.

Somewhere between the main course and dessert, the subject of having a Japanese university team broke into the conversation as a possible opponent for the Runnin' Rebels. Yoshinaga said he would put in a call to Japan to find out if he could line up a representative team for UNLV and before he left Las Vegas, the game with Meiji was made.

It will be the first time a Japanese university team will play against a major American collegiate basketball power. The Japanese national team, and several "all-star" teams have toured the U.S. but as far as a single Japanese university team playing against a major U.S. team is concerned, tonight's game is a historic "first."

Basketball observers in Japan consider this game a major breakthrough for basketball among Japanese university teams. Other universities in Japan will be looking closely at the results, not so much from the finals points posted on the scoreboard, but how the Japanese players react to facing one of the best teams in America, coached by the winningest coach in collegiate basketball in Jerry Tarkanian.

Basketball in Japan was among the best in the Orient for a number of years in the 50s and 60s, but another sport came onto the scene and many potential young athletes, eyeing the chance to play in the Olympic Games, opted for the other game...volleyball.

And, volleyball did, indeed, become the top sport for Japan in world competition. However, in recent years, many of the younger players are returning to basketball and Japan is slowly returning to the top in the Orient.

Several post-season tournaments, featuring top American college teams, have heightened the resurgence of interest among the young athletes, as they have had the opportunity to see some of the best players in the world participate.

Let's "roll out the red carpet" for a great season with OUR Runnin' Rebels!

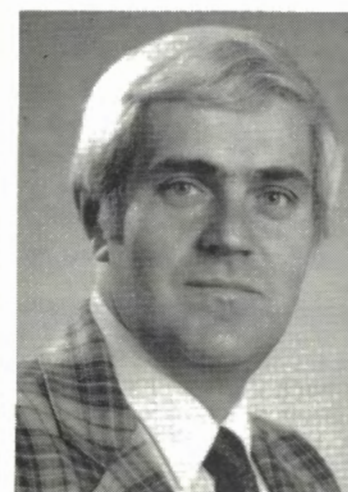

Jerry Tarkanian...More Than Just A Coach

Year for his efforts on behalf of that organization. He also runs state-wide basketball camps and clinics for youngsters of all ages as well as being an active member of various charitable organizations.

The University recognized what he has been doing for the Las Vegas community and named him Assistant Athletic Director with designated duties as Director of Community Relations in 1982.

While at UNLV, Tarkanian has molded the Rebels into a veritable basketball dynasty. In his 11 season, he has failed to win 20 games just once—in 1980-81 when his Rebels were 16-12. He has guided his teams to the NCAA Tournament five times and the NIT twice. In the 1976-77 season, UNLV placed third in the NCAA Tournament by beating North Carolina-Charlotte 106-94 in the Consolation Game. In the 1979-80 season, the Rebels finished fourth in the NIT. UNLV under Tarkanian currently has a 10-6 post-season record.

The 1983-84 campaign was another masterpiece for the Runnin' Rebels. The team was 29-6—the third time Tarkanian has won as many as 29 games at UNLV—and advanced to the Far West Regional Final of the NCAA before losing to eventual national champion Georgetown. UNLV was the first team in the nation to reach the 21-, 22-, 23-win plateaus. The team captured its second consecutive PCAA regular season title with a 16-2 mark. Finally, Tarkanian was named Coach-of-the-Year by *Basketball Times* and the PCAA for 1984. He had been UPI's choice in 1983.

UNLV is not the only school that Tarkanian has had coaching success. At Cal State Long Beach from 1968-72, he compiled a 122-20 (.859) in five seasons and reached the NCAA four times. He never lost a home game in those five seasons, including a streak of 65 home wins in a row. He also earned other honors at Long Beach, including being named Professor-of-the-Year and Salesman-of-the-Year for his job of promoting the University.

Prior to CSULB, Tarkanian coached at Pasadena City College for two seasons (1966-68). He was 67-4 over those two seasons and won a California Junior College Championship to wrap-up the 1966-67 season.

Tarkanian started his collegiate coaching career at Riverside City College and in five seasons compiled a 145-22 record. After a first season

record of 14-13, Tarkanian guided Riverside to three California Junior College Championships, including a perfect season (1963-64) of 35-0.

Another attribute that Tarkanian is widely known for is his ability to recruit. He is known in basketball circles as the "Pied Piper of Basketball Recruiting"—a title he is indeed worthy of.

Every year, no matter how thin the recruiting field is, Tarkanian manages to attract only the top prospects.

Among the top recruits Tarkanian managed to bring to Long Beach during his years there include: George Trapp, Chuck Terry, Ed Ratleff, Leonard Gray and Roscoe Poindexter. His reputation as a great recruiter continued to grow at UNLV. As he took the Rebels into the national limelight throughout his 11 seasons, he attracted such stars as: Eddie Owens (Houston, Texas); Lewis Brown and Jackie Robinson (both high school All-Americans from Los Angeles). He has also brought to Las Vegas Robert Smith (Los Angeles), Reggie Theus (Inglewood, Calif.), Larry Moffett (Gary, Indiana), Richard Box (Riverside, Calif.), and Las Vegas products Sam Smith and Michael "Spiderman" Burns.

More recently, his recruiting list included 1979 New York City Player-of-the-Year Sidney Green, 1979 Pittsburgh Player-of-the-Year Larry Anderson and 1978 Los Angeles Player-of-the-Year Michael Johnson. He has also brought in the likes of 1982 Los Angeles Player-of-the-Year Eldridge Hudson, his son and current UNLV record holder in career steals and assists Danny Tarkanian, former University of San Francisco star Eric Booker, former University of Arizona star Jeff Collins, Las Vegas prep star Freddie Banks, former Indiana University star John Flowers, Frank "Spoon" James (Baltimore, Maryland), Ed Catchings (Los Angeles), and Richard Robinson (Granada Hills, Calif.).

Many of Tarkanian's players do not end their basketball careers at college. Among the players coached by Tarkanian that have gone on to the professional ranks include: Chuck Terry (Houston Rockets), Eric McWilliams (Houston Rockets), George Trapp (Detroit Pistons), Bob Rule (Cleveland Cavaliers), Ed Ratleff (Houston Rockets), John Trapp (Los Angeles Lakers), Glenn MacDonald (Boston Celtics), and

Leonard Gray (Seattle Supersonics).

UNLV alumni in the pros at one time or another include: Ricky Sobers (Chicago Bulls), Larry Moffett (Houston Rockets), Eddie Owens (Buffalo Braves), Jackie Robinson (Seattle Supersonics), Sam Smith (Chicago Bulls), Glen Gondrezick (Denver Nuggets), Sidney Green (Chicago Bulls), and Reggie Theus (Chicago Bulls, Kansas City Kings). In addition, four members of the 1983-84 Rebel squad were selected in the recent college draft. They are Jeff Collins (Phoenix Suns, 4th round),

Danny Tarkanian (San Antonio Spurs, 8th round), Eric Booker (Utah Jazz, 8th round), and Paul Brozovich (Golden State Warriors, 8th round).

In Tarkanian's 11 years at UNLV, a total of 23 players have been drafted by the NBA. Six players alone from the 1976-77 team were drafted by the NBA—an NCAA and NBA record.

Tarkanian has been honored with other coaching duties throughout his stellar career. He coached in Ecuador for the People-to-People Sports Committee in April and May of 1968 and he

also coached the Junior College Olympic Team that same year.

A native of Euclid, Ohio, Tarkanian attended Pasadena City College before graduating from Fresno State in 1955. He then went on to earn his Masters degree—with honors—in Educational Management from Redlands University.

Tarkanian and his wife Lois, the former Lois Huter, reside with their four children—Pamela, Jodie, Danny and George—in the Charleston Heights Section of Las Vegas.

New Rebs Best Since 76-77 Squad?

Rarely when a team loses four of its top nine players to graduation is there much cause for optimism, but University of Nevada, Las Vegas Coach Jerry Tarkanian's 1984-85 Runnin' Rebels are an exception.

Once again, it appears that the Runnin' Rebels will live up to their nickname as this will be one of the quickest UNLV teams that Tarkanian has coached. Moreover, the fact that this squad is filled with good shooters may make it comparable to Tarkanian's 1976-77 Rebel team which averaged 112 points per game and reached the Final Four.

Gone from the 1983-84 squad, which captured the PCAA regular season championship and advanced to the NCAA Western Regionals before losing to eventual national champion Georgetown University, are starting guards Danny Tarkanian (the school's all-time steal and assist leader) and Jeff Collins, as well as part-time starters center Paul Brozovich and swingman Eric Booker. All four were drafted by NBA teams. Also gone from the 29-6 team is reserve guard Tom Roberts.

Despite the losses, Tarkanian, the 1983-84 *Basketball Times* and PCAA Coach-of-the-Year, feels confident about his team's ability to match last year's success.

"We do return five players who contributed a great deal to our team last

year," Tarkanian noted. "In addition to those, we have some fine redshirts who we hope can step in and offset the losses of the seniors."

Heading the impressive list of returnees is All-American candidate Richie Adams (SR, 6-9, 225), the PCAA Player-of-the Year and Tournament MVP last season. According to Tarkanian, Adams, who led UNLV in both scoring and rebounding last year, will be a major factor in the squad's success in the 1984-85 season.

"Richie has a tremendous amount of ability. With him, it's just a matter of how good he wants to be. But, we'll just have to wait and see how he responds," Tarkanian said.

Also returning for the Rebels this season are forwards Ed Catchings (Sr. 6-8, 201) and Frank "Spoon" James (SR, 6-6, 187), starters last year in 21 of 25 games, respectively. Additionally, two players who made outstanding progress in 1983-84, center John Flowers (Sr. 6-10, 225) and guard Fred Banks (SO, 6-5, 156), will be back. UNLV will also have guard Ricky Collier (SO, 6-5, 186), who showed promise as a freshman last year.

The Rebels will also have the services of five outstanding redshirts from last season: Anthony Jones (JR, 6-6, 195), a transfer from Georgetown; Eldridge Hudson (SO, 6-6, 212), who sat out last year recover-

ing from a knee injury; Richard Robinson (FR, 6-9, 206), who played in five games last season before contracting mononucleosis and being declared a medical redshirt; Gary Graham (SO, 6-4, 185), who played in 28 games as a freshman during the 1982-83 season; and Armon Gilliam (SO, 6-8, 230), a transfer from Independence Junior College in Kansas.

In addition, the Rebels signed two recruits to add depth to the squad in Leon Symanski, a 6-8 forward from Orange Coast Junior College, and Chris Fancher, a 6-0 guard from Crawford County High School in Marengo, Indiana.

Tarkanian feels that this combination of players could form an excellent team, but recognizes the possible problems.

"I think we have the potential to be a very fine team. We have good depth, good size and good quickness. These factors should allow us to set the pace in most games and play more aggressively on defense than we have in the past. We'll certainly have the opportunity to substitute more freely so that all of our players can stay fresh," said Tarkanian.

Though Tarkanian doesn't see any real weaknesses for this team, he does have some concerns.

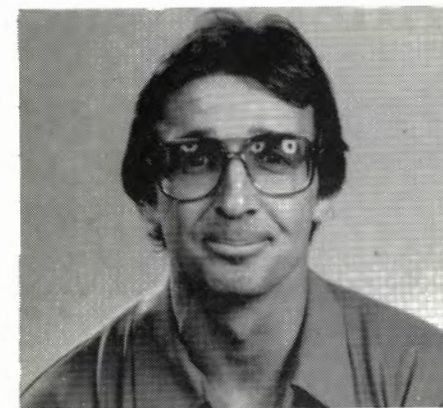
"I don't think that we have any major weaknesses, but we do have some question marks. Eldridge (Hudson) is still recovering from his injury, and his status for the season is unknown. We also need to get some good leadership, but I'm not sure who will step out to provide that. We're really counting on Freddie (Banks) and Gary (Graham) to handle the point guard position for us. However, it's important that Freddie improve on his defense from last year," Tarkanian said.

Another obstacle the Rebels will encounter is one of the strongest schedules in UNLV history. In addition to the always competitive PCAA schedule, the Rebels non-conference opponents include Georgetown, Maryland, San Diego State, Kansas State and Colorado State.

Understandably, Tarkanian is concerned.

"This is one of the toughest schedules we've ever faced. Practically all of the conference teams have improved since last year, and we have some super non-conference teams coming in here. In addition to those, we will be making a trip to Georgetown for a rematch with the defending NCAA champs."

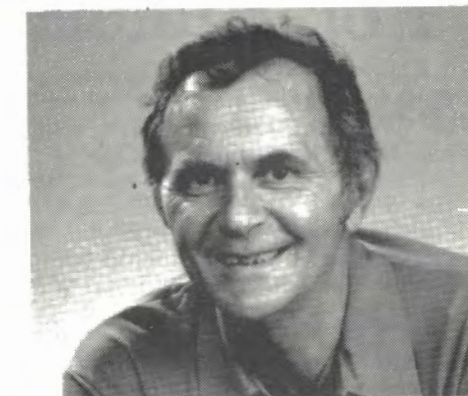

For Richie Adams, The Climb To The

Not often, but every once in a while someone comes along who becomes an overnight sensation. He always had the potential and the talent but perhaps didn't channel his energies in the right direction. Suddenly, something happens—something that few can explain—that turns him into one of the hottest and most talked about persons in his field.

UNLV forward/center Richie Adams seemingly came out of nowhere during the 1983-84 basketball season to win the PCAA Player-of-the-Year award and the acclaim of all who saw him play. He enters the 1984-85 season as one of the leading candidates for All-America honors.

Adams is recognized in basketball circles as having awesome talent. He can do so many things to help a team win. He's a tremendous leaper, a strong rebounder, and has worked on his outside shooting to the point that he has developed a very dependable 15-foot jump shot. Yet, there's more to Adams that makes him UNLV's biggest threat on a team that is so talented and so deep. He has the ability to take control of a situation when the team most needs a lift.

"Richie has the capability to dominate a game—especially when it is on the line," said UNLV assistant coach and recruiting coordinator Mark Warkentien. "He can go out on the court and literally take the game out of the coaches' hands."

There are several times during the past season where Adams has shown this ability, but there is one cold January night in Logan, Utah which probably best illustrates the point. At the time, UNLV was undefeated in conference with only one loss overall. Playing before the seventh largest crowd in the history of Utah State's Spectrum, the Rebels seemed to be in a snakepit with little hope for escape. Utah State had overcome a 73-65 deficit to tie the game 73-all with just under four minutes remaining to play. Needing a basket desperately to end the drought and quiet the screaming throngs in the Spectrum, Adams took a pass and saw a crack of daylight down the baseline and with a tremendous first step drove to the basket and slammed home two points while drawing a foul. Adams then calmly hit the free throw to complete the three point play. He also canned four of UNLV's next six points to lead the Rebels to a five point victory.

That night has been singled out by many as the turning point for Richie Adams—turning him from just another player with great talent into the PCAA's Player-of-the-Year.



There were other honors bestowed on Adams for his performances during last season. Associated Press named him as an honorable mention All-America; he was first team All-PCAA; he was named to the PCAA All-Tournament team and was selected as the MVP of that tourney. Richie Adams, it seems, has come of age.

"Richie has great athletic ability," said Rebel Head Coach Jerry Tarkanian, who in his 22 years of coaching has sent 23 players to the NBA. "He really surprised all of us with how well he did last year. He has tremendous quickness and is a great leaper. There is nobody his size (6-9, 225) who can jump any higher or quicker."

Adams was UNLV's leading scorer in 1983-84 with a 12.7 average on a team that had seven players average at least seven ppg. In PCAA games, Adams average 15.0 ppg, also a Rebel high. He was the team's top rebounder averaging 6.7 rpg overall and 7.7 rpg in PCAA play. He shot a very respectable 70 percent from the foul line and, although there are no stats to back this up, was even a better foul shooter when the game was on the line. He shot very well from the field with a .576 mark—second on the team to Ed Catchings. His defense was also improved as evidenced by his team leading 57 blocked shots and his third best total of 44 steals.

With all the numerous honors, all the acclaim, the crowds chanting Rit-chaaaay, Rit-chaaaay, it must not be forgotten that Richie Adams has not had an easy time of it—he has had to struggle every step of the way.

Top Was Much Steeper Than Most

His first season as a Rebel was 1981-82 and Adams played in 29 games, 14 as a starter, and averaged 7.5 ppg and 4.7 rpg. The following September, however, he left UNLV to return to New York because of his grandmother's death. He returned to UNLV in November but Tarkanian redshirted Adams. Confused and hurt, Adams decided to return home to the Bronx. After finally realizing that pro basketball was his way to get his mother out of the Bronx, he returned to UNLV the following September.

Adams' third arrival at UNLV left Tarkanian with his doubts. He wasn't going to take Adams back until his son Danny, the starting point guard last season and UNLV's career steal and assist leader, talked his father into giving Adams another chance. For UNLV and Richie Adams, three really was a charm.

"He's much more settled now," said Tarkanian. "He's happy. He has a better perspective of himself. I was so happy for Richie when he won PCAA Player-of-the-Year. He worked

hard and earned it."

As a result of his outstanding season in 1983-84, Adams moved up to 30th on the All-Time UNLV scoring list. With another great season, he has the possibility of moving up to the top 15, with the likes of Michael Burns, Richard Box and Reggie Theus.

The Richie Adams story has taken many paths over his 21 years. The story now finds him on a new path, the path towards a successful career and more importantly, a successful life. Richie Adams has won the adoration of the Las Vegas fans, the respect of his collegiate coaches throughout the nation, the admiration of his fellow players and has caught the eyes of pro scouts. They all see Richie Adams as the PCAA's top player, as a legitimate All-America candidate, as a basketball player with outstanding athletic ability and as a person who is very happy to be at UNLV. What they should remember is that Richie Adams has to work much harder than most to get where he is today, and that alone makes him an All-America.

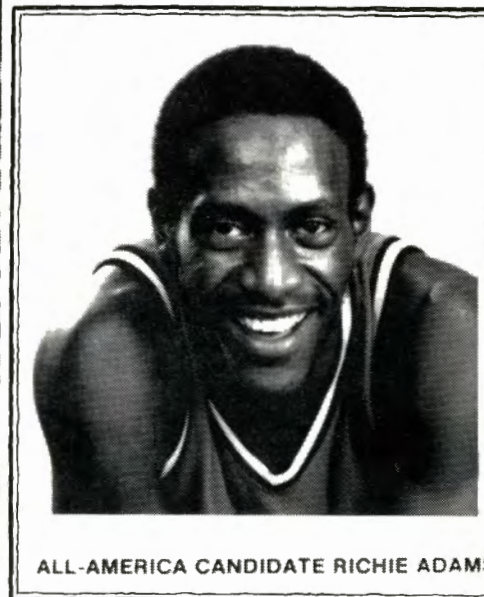
Boyd Grant, head coach at Fresno

State said "Richie Adams is a great competitor. He has a bit of Bill Russell in him. What I mean by that is Richie's greatest intimidation factor—you might have him beat at first but his quickness and leaping ability allow him to recover and cause problems for someone trying to shoot over him."

"I'll say this—he is the best player in the PCAA and I see no reason why he wouldn't have the same kind of season as last year. He has great ability and seems like a person who has a lot of his act together."

Rod Tueller, head coach of Utah State University adds: "Richie Adams is an outstanding basketball player. I was very impressed with him when we played against him. He does some very unorthodox things well. I don't mean that as a criticism—he's just not an easy player to plan strategy against. He's a good rejector, a great leaper and he has the ability to dominate a game. He's somebody you just can't ignore."

On Adam's part, he is one who doesn't want to be ignored.



ALL-AMERICA CANDIDATE RICHIE ADAMS

THE UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA, LAS VEGAS

The University of Nevada, Las Vegas, one of the fastest growing institutions of higher education in the southwest, is a component of the University of Nevada system, which is governed by the seven-member Nevada Board of Regents.

UNLV recently celebrated its 25th anniversary. The extensive academic programs provided on UNLV's large, beautiful campus prove the explosive growth of higher education since its birth in southern Nevada.

After several years of providing extension courses in southern Nevada staffed by faculty from the University of Nevada in Reno, the state legislature officially established the Southern Regional Division of the university in 1957. That same year the first building on campus—Maude Frazier Hall—was opened.

By the mid-1960s, the university had become a four-year degree-granting institution known as Nevada Southern University. Full autonomy, with status equal to UNR, came in 1968. The following year the regents gave the campus its new name: University of Nevada, Las Vegas (UNLV).

The 335-acre campus is located two miles from the Las Vegas Strip in the heart of a busy commercial and residential area. On-campus facilities serve over 11,000 graduate and undergraduate students as well as provide a center for cultural and extended educational experiences for the community.

Points of interest on the campus include the following:

Museum of Natural History—With specialized exhibits to illustrate the story of man in this region, the museum is open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays. 739-3399.

Atrium and Aviary—This lush garden and bird sanctuary is located in the lobby of Juanita Greer White Hall. The building is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays. 739-3399.

Art Gallery—Exhibits by students, faculty and nationally renowned artists are changed every 2-3 weeks in the gallery, which is located in the northwest corner of the Alta Ham Fine Arts Building (HFA-153). Hours are noon to 4 p.m., Mon.-Sat.

McDermott Physical Education Center—This large, well equipped facility is open to the public. Hours vary. Phone number: 739-3150/3157.

Center for the Performing Arts—At the northern end of the campus mall area are two auditoriums: Artemus W. Ham Concert Hall, which is the scene of regularly scheduled concerts (739-3801); and Judy Bayley Theatre, where plays are staged throughout the year (739-3801). On the plaza between them is The Flashlight, a 38-foot-tall, 74,000-pound steel sculpture by internationally known artist Claus Oldenburg.

LAS VEGAS, THE CITY

The city of Las Vegas, Nevada is a thriving metropolis of nearly half-a-million permanent residents nestled in a desert valley near the southernmost tip of the state.

Located in the scenic southwestern United States, Las Vegas is within a 30-mile radius of Lake Mead; the massive Hoover Dam and Colorado River recreational area; the snow skiing trails of 12,000 foot Mt. Charleston; and a panorama of red-rock mountains, eroded sandstone landscapes and replicas of old western towns. Also, within easy reach is the Southern California coastal areas, Arizona's Grand Canyon, California's Death Valley and Southern

During the past three years, UNLV has embarked on an ambitious \$60 million construction program which has resulted in four new buildings on campus — three of them the direct result of local philanthropy.

Ground was broken in 1981 for the Thomas and Mack Center, an 18,500-seat sports pavilion, and it opened in November 1983 to become the new home of the Runnin' Rebel basketball team. The university expects to book a wide variety of events into this spacious facility, named for longtime university donors E. Parry Thomas and Jerome Mack.

Construction also was completed in 1983 on an \$11.7 million building to house both the College of Business and Economics and the College of Hotel Administration — Frank and Estella Beam Hall (named for the parents of donor Thomas T. Beam). In addition to many specialized facilities to meet the needs of both colleges, the structure features a semi-covered outdoor patio.

A generous gift from local attorney Artemus W. Ham, Jr., provided the seed money for the recently opened Alta Ham Fine Arts Building. Named for Ham's late mother, the \$5 million facility houses the theatre arts, music, art and dance programs. It also contains an innovative Black Box Theatre for smaller-scale theatre productions as well as the campus' Fine Arts Gallery.

Finally a \$7 million, four-story addition to the James R. Dickinson Library opened in Fall 1981,

providing special facilities and more room for the expanded library holdings required by a growing student population.

A distinguished faculty of more than 400 men and women are actively involved in teaching, research and community service. Faculty members, 77% with doctorates, have come to UNLV from many of the great learning centers of the country — M.I.T., Yale, Harvard, Berkeley, Stanford.

Bachelors degrees are awarded in 46 major subjects, and there are 26 programs which lead to master's degrees. Specialist degrees and doctorates are offered in the field of education. All programs have been fully accredited by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges.

UNLV operates on the semester system with a Mini Term offered between the fall and spring semesters. During the summer there are two five-week summer sessions. This arrangement of course offerings provides students with a wide range of scheduling possibilities.

The Las Vegas community is served directly by an ambitious continuing education program at UNLV. Approximately 16,000 local residents take part annually in more than 500 credit and non-credit courses. These "Classes for People" are designed with a wide range of potential students in mind: nurses, teachers and other professionals who need courses to stay current in their fields; housewives who want to develop new skills; business people; children; and anyone interested in the Southern Nevada environment.

Meiji University Set The Tone For Today's Japan

Meiji University's history dates back to 1881, when a group of young scholars, dedicated to the instruction of scholarly French law and the humanities and sciences, established Meiji Law School, providing equal opportunity for education for generations to come.

A private institution, Meiji Law School was originally formed by scholars who intended to modernize Japan and Japanese education with European techniques. During its development into the university system of today, individuals associated with the institution had to overcome many difficulties and restrictions to achieve freedom of learning and the search for truth.

Tatsuo Kishimoto, one of the founders of Meiji Law School, was one of the students sent by the Ministry of Justice to Europe, where he studied French Law at the University of Paris. He returned to Japan in February, 1880, and participated in the development of a new science of law for the government in the early Meiji Era (1868-1912). He felt the importance and need to promote the spread of knowledge of French Law in Japan. In 1881, he decided to found Meiji Law School and gathered other scholars interested in the founder's intentions and drew the attention of the entire nation.

Meiji Law School moved to one of its present-day campuses in 1886 to accommodate its growing student body under Kishimoto, who took over as the institution's president at that time.

In 1888, the Ministry of Education designated Meiji Law School as a specially approved educational institution and divided the Schools of Law and Political Science. The two schools led the way in the development of modern institutions of higher learning, but faced many serious financial difficulties as a private school.

Meiji's status as a university was formally recognized by the government in 1903 and the school was renamed Meiji University, adding the Schools of Commerce and Literature. The School of Literature had to close because of diminishing student enrollment, but the university kept alive the desire to reestablish it for many years and in 1932, it was reopened.

In 1904, the School of Commerce was the first among Japanese institutions to inaugurate a program that has served as a model for commerce education in Japan. As Japan developed as a capitalistic nation, it was necessary for industrial and business circles to develop their human resources to serve society.

The School of Commerce met these needs and occupied a respected position while serving in the development of the university as a whole.

Meiji became a full-fledged university in 1925 with the establishment of three additional schools and a three-year college.

A women's college was established in 1929 to offer the first opportunity for women in Japan who desired to seek higher education.

The university was granted a charter in 1952 for a new post-graduate educational program in each school, dedicated to the instruction in advanced study and research. The School of Business Administration was the first of its kind in Japan and established in 1953.

With the growth of the nation, Meiji University has remained as one of the eminent universities in Japan, with an enrollment of over 30,000. On November 4, 1980, the university celebrated its centennial anniversary at Tokyo Budokan Hall.

Over 200,000 students have graduated from Meiji and they have made great contributions to the Japanese society.

In more recent times, the university has adopted a policy of admitting a number of foreign students each year. Qualified foreign students are accorded special consideration for ad-

mission to Meiji.

Except for students sent by foreign government, Japan does not issue permits to foreign students to enter Japan without university admission credentials issued from accredited schools, such as Meiji, in Japan.

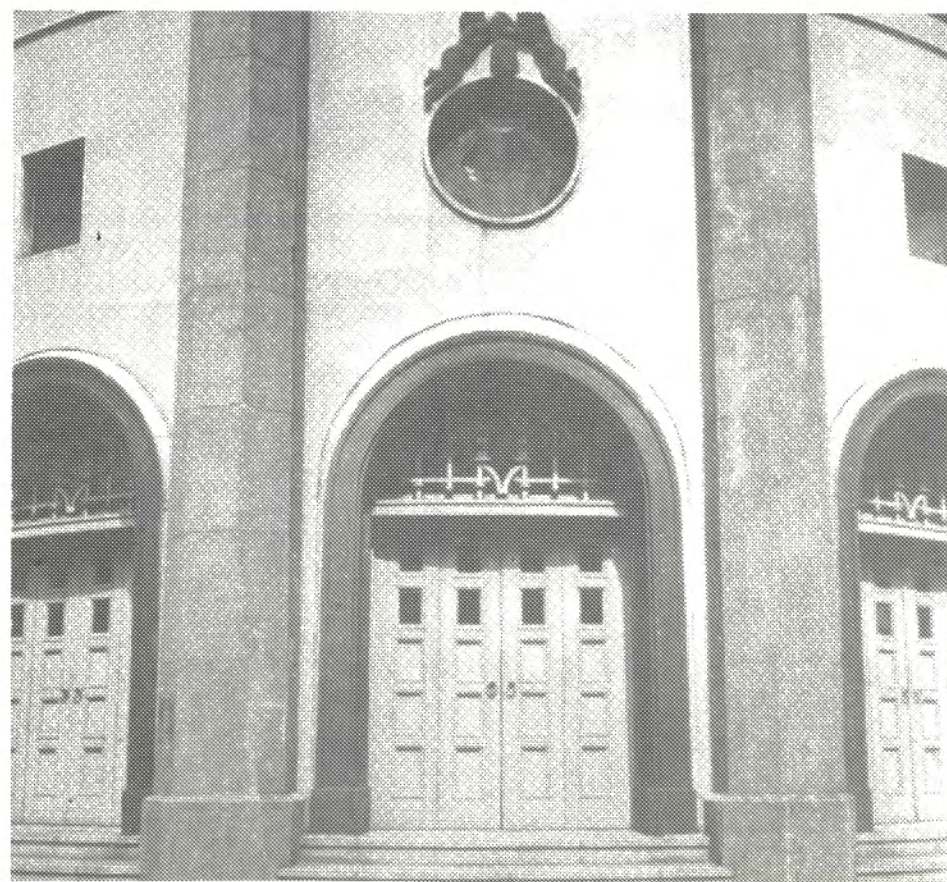
Admission to Meiji in all cases is determined by the university and appropriate selection examination. Applicants must be proficient enough in Japanese to study and do research at the university. If the applicant's language ability is not adequate, he or she must complete at least one year of Japanese language instruction at an authorized language institution in Japan.

All the Meiji schools offer courses leading to a Bachelor's Degree with graduate programs leading to Master's and Doctoral Degrees.

Japan's private universities, with Meiji taking the lead, have contributed greatly to the progress of all students both Japanese and foreigners.

Private universities in Japan, as in other countries, rely on funds from private sources, tuition and fees, and receive little financial aid from the government. Nevertheless, eighty percent of all college students in Japan, study at private universities.

And, Meiji University has set the tone for today's Japan.

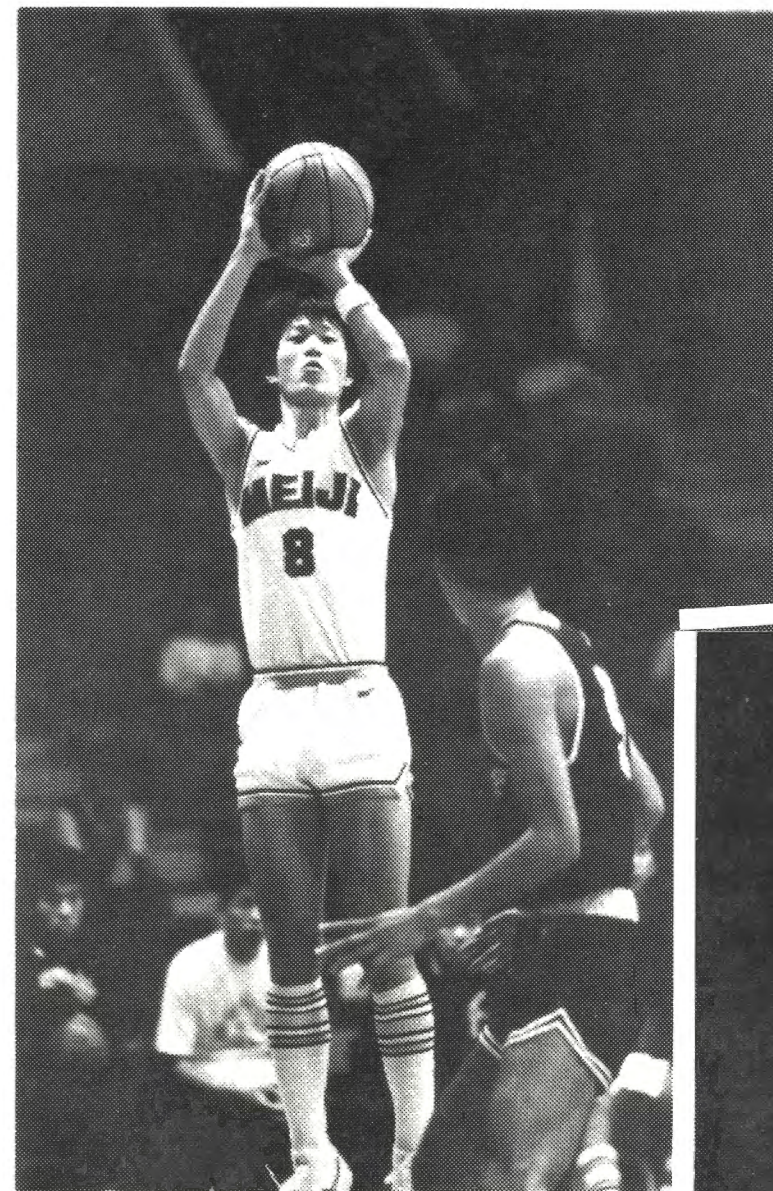
Meiji Shooters Eye a Hot Hand

"In Japan, at 6-4, I am right up there with most of the players as far as height is concerned but after looking over the Las Vegas roster, I know that my task will be a little different than when I play in our league back in Japan."

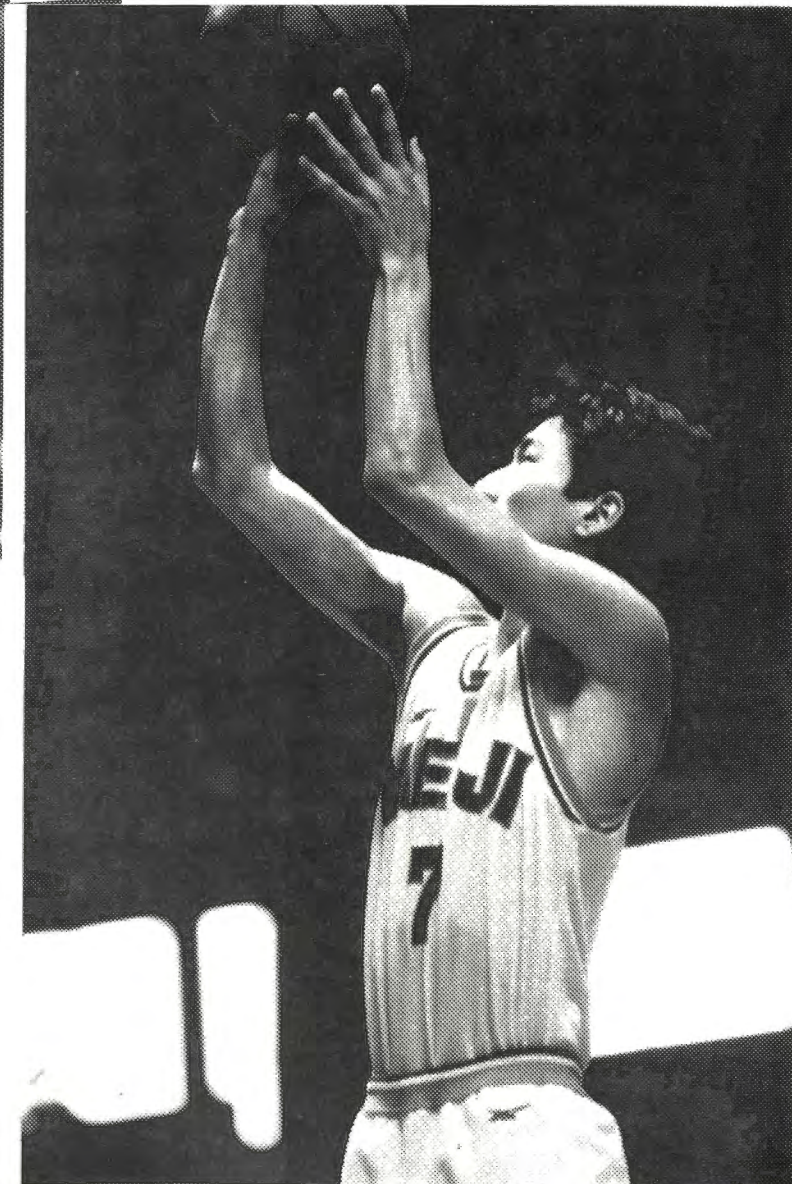

Masayuki Okabe was named captain of the Meiji team for the U.S. trip because as Coach Kyoichiro Hayashi said, "he gives leadership to our team both with his play and his maturity."

The 6-5 forward, who claims a vertical jump of nearly 30 inches, says the most important thing about playing UNLV is not to be intimidated by the physically bigger American players. "If I can get my shots, I am confident that I'll be able to put down my share of baskets," he said.

Okabe averaged nearly 20 points a game in league play which is an indication that he can score points. "It certainly will be a challenge to both our team and to me personally to see how we will stack up against a tough opponent like Las Vegas."

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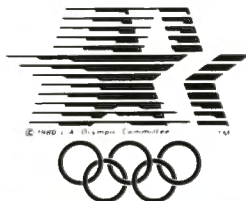

No Ref Baiting For Meiji's Coach Hayashi

No matter how the officials may call the game, you won't find Kyoichiro Hayashi, head coach of the Meiji University basketball team, ranting and raving on the bench.

The reason is simple...when he's not coaching, Hayashi is often called upon to put on the striped shirt and put a whistle in his mouth to perform as a referee.

One of a handful of licensed F.I.B.A. referees in Japan, Hayashi usually referees games involving international competition held in Japan.

His most memorable assignment, by his own testimony, is working the Olympic Games basketball competition during the Tokyo Games, won the the United States team in 1964.

Because of his excellent work during the Olympics, Hayashi was also invited to be one of the officials at the Universiade Games in Hungary the following year in 1965.

Hayashi feels he learned much about his approach to coaching basketball while working games as an official. "Especially the international games under international rules, which differs in many areas from the way the game is played in the United States," he said. "I personally favor the U.S. rules because under international rules there is a lot more contact and it can get rather rough on the court and as far as the Japanese teams are concerned, it is not to their advantage to have to battle the physically larger foreign teams."

Hayashi honed his coaching skills under Pete Newell, who coached the University of California, Berkeley, team to a national championship in the mid-50s.

"Coach Newell comes to Japan often and conducts clinics for players and coaches and his presence has had an impact on basketball as it is played in Japan," said Hayashi.

Hayashi began his coaching career at the high school level, winning the national prep championships with Meiji High School in 1962. He later became head coach of the Daiwa Security industrial league basketball team, holding the position for ten years and winning numerous titles.

There is no professional basketball played in Japan and the industrial league is the closest to what can be called "pro ball," as the rosters are filled with former college stars and imported American talent. At the present time, there are a dozen former U.S. college stars on the rosters of industrial league teams.

Most of the Americans are those who barely missed making it to the NBA so their presence on Japanese teams makes an considerable impact on the strength of the teams.

Hayashi took over as head coach of Meiji after serving as assistant for several years. The change to elevate him to the head position was made when Meiji failed to win the Japan national college championships last year.

Meiji has always been regarded as the top basketball schools in Japan and their failure to win the title resulted in the coaching change.

Meiji has won the national college championships eight times, the Kanto Area (Tokyo) championships nine times and the Big Six League crown nine times.

Meiji fans have grown used to winning and hope that the change

to Hayashi will return them to the top of the Japanese basketball scene in 1984-85.

Hayashi takes a realistic view of his game with UNLV and says that his team will have to play errorless ball and also have a lot of luck to stay close. "I have been told by some of my friends in the American coaching fraternity that UNLV will be among the top teams in the United States this coming season which has caused me to lose some sleep about our confrontation," said Hayashi.

"But who would imagine that Syracuse would beat Nebraska in football this year when they were saying that Nebraska was a super team of our times."

Hayashi, obviously, follows all facets of American sports when he makes reference to American football in making the analogy between Meiji's hope for a win against the major upset in this year's college football season.

Meiji, according to Hayashi, will play a running game, which is also the Runnin' Rebels strong suite. "We have some excellent outside shooters and if they are on their game, we can be very competitive," said Hayashi. "Of course, when I see the size of players like Richie Adams and John Flowers, I know we will have to work extra hard under the boards but to use an old cliché, the ball does often take crazy bounces. We hope we are the recipient of some of these bounces."

No matter how the game turns out, Hayashi says his younger players will benefit by their exposure to top class American players. "We will probably never face a team as good as Las Vegas," he concluded.

ON THE JOB TRAINING

who was hurt, what the extent of the injury is, an assessment of what the athlete can and cannot do, and what treatment was given.

There is also a notebook in which all rehabilitation records of the athletes are kept. The various files for all athletes go as far back as seven years, mostly for the trainers protection if anyone should question treatment given months or even years after-the-fact.

"We also keep a complete record of medications given to the athletes," said Wilson. "We only give out over-the-counter medications unless we get a doctor's approval to give a prescription medication."

The trainers can evaluate and diagnose just about all injuries, barring bone problems. In these cases, Koloskie or one of his assistants will recommend that the athlete be sent for x-rays of the injured area.

Working with Koloskie and Wilson is Assistant Athletic Trainer Peanuts Boyer, who is in her second year with the training staff. Boyer earned her Bachelor of Science from the University of Pittsburgh in 1979 and her Master of Science from Southwest Texas State in 1982.

"We have a great situation here (at UNLV), said Boyer. "We each have our own responsibilities but any athlete can come in here and talk to any of us (Boyer, Wilson or Koloskie). It's different from some other situations I've been in."

Boyer's main responsibility is women's sports and in particular women's basketball. She oversees that all sports are covered by scheduling student trainers to each one and then monitoring their progress.

"The trainer is hired basically to reduce medical costs," said Koloskie. "The athletic trainer's curriculum is extensive to the point where we can see the injury, evaluate it and diagnose the problem. Of course, we are in constant contact with the team doctors and we work with them when the injury is more extensive."

UNLV's training facility now possesses the sophisticated equipment needed to perform most treatment and rehabilitation services right on campus. Among the advancements include the Cybex — which is used for testing the athlete to aid in rehabilitation — and the Jobst Cryo Temp Unit — which is used to treat acute injuries right when they happen.

"There was a time when I first arrived here where we didn't have the necessary equipment

and we would have to take the athletes off-campus," explained Koloskie. "Now, thanks largely to the cooperation from the athletic department and the community, we have the necessary equipment needed to compare with any other major college program."

Being a trainer takes a tremendous amount of dedication due to the high amount of hours that are put into the job. While a student trainer, you need a bare minimum — in UNLV's program — of 800 hours under the direction of a head trainer. According to Koloskie, however, a typical student trainer in UNLV's three year program will amass around 2,000 to 3,000 hours of work.

The first year of student training is spent doing the so-called "dirty work" jobs. Everyday tasks such as making ice-bags, taping athletes and learning to use all of the equipment are among the things needed to be done. By the time a student-trainer reaches his/her second and third years, they have had the classes needed to evaluate most common injuries.

"The student-trainers usually don't evaluate until their junior or senior year," said Wilson. "By that time, they have had some evaluation classes and can do things within their capability."

With 15 intercollegiate men's and women's sports to take care of, the UNLV training staff is spread quite thinly. The sports with the highest demand are, according to Koloskie, basketball, football and soccer, due to a much higher injury rate than the other sports.

"With the other non-revenue sports, injury rates are not as high but they are still just as important," Koloskie said. "We cover all of the sports and try to meet the needs of all."

It is an awesome task — meeting the needs of all — but UNLV's trainers are as hard-working as any staff on the UNLV campus. The next time you see a trainer running out on the field to help an injured player or provide some water, remember that there is so much more involved in being a trainer.

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UNLV ATHLETICS—ALIVE WITH PRIDE

The University of Nevada, Las Vegas enjoyed its most successful year in recent history. UNLV can now boast its first ever national champion as native Sheila Tarr captured first at the NCAA championships in the heptathlon. Also, UNLV had 12 of its 14 intercollegiate sports invited to national post-season competition. The previous high was three sports. Lastly, the UNLV athletic department can boast being in the black for only the second time in the last 13 years.

UNLV's Director of Athletics Dr. Brad Rothermel is thrilled with his program's progress.

"We (the university) had tremendous growth in the quality of our athletic program at UNLV," said Rothermel. "Now our goal is to repeat and improve on it next year."

The 1983-84 season was full of highlights, but the highlight of them all has to be Lady Rebel track sensation Tarr. Tarr, a freshman from Bonanza High School, fulfilled and exceeded everyone's expectations by capturing the NCAA national championship in the heptathlon.

The Runnin' Rebel basketball team, as usual, had a magnificent season. The team was ranked as high as fourth in the nation

at one time, was the first to win 23 games during the 1983-84 season, and advanced in the NCAA tournament to the Far West Regional Finals before losing to eventual National Champ Georgetown.

The Rebel soccer team also advanced to the Far West Regional Final of the NCAA tournament before losing to perennial soccer power USF. Behind second year head coach Barry Barto, the Rebels won a school record 17 games, was ranked in the top 20 for the first time, and invited to the NCAA's for the first time.

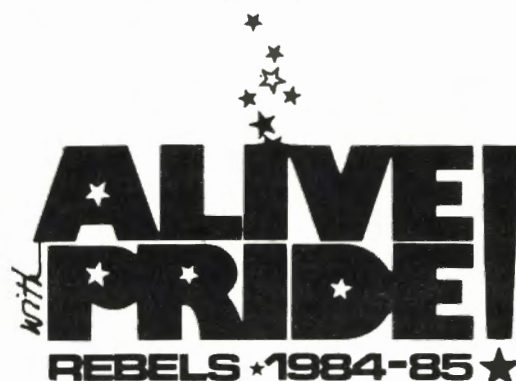
Fred Dallimore's Hustlin Rebel baseball team was ranked as high as 16th in the nation; finished second in the SCBA behind national champions CSU-Fullerton; won over 40 games for only the fourth time in school history; and advanced to the finals of the Central Regional of the NCAA's before losing to defending national champ Texas, and Lamar University.

"This was without question the finest year we have had since my first year (1980-81) at UNLV," said Rothermel. "We have great coaches and great student-athletes who deserve tremendous credit for their accomplishments."

The Lady Rebel track team, under the guidance of coaches Al McDaniels and Mike Strong, had more than Sheila Tarr to be proud of. The whole team finished 25th at the NCAA Championships and throughout the season had several individuals ranked in the top 20.

The Lady Rebel basketball team started the pre-season ranked 19th in the nation and finished with a PCAA championship and first-ever bid to the NCAA playoffs. Lady Rebel Misty Thomas also distinguished herself by setting a UNLV single season assist record and making the Canadian Olympic Team which competed in the 1984 Los Angeles games. Thomas is a native of Windsor, Ontario, Canada.

Lady Rebel swimming had a pleasant surprise when freshman Camille Nix, a native of Henderson, NV, qualified for the NCAA swimming and diving champion-



ships in the 50 yard free. Nix just missed earning All-America status by a scant .06 seconds. As a team, the Lady Rebels won the first ever PCAA championships.

The Rebel swimming team did very well, finishing third in the PCAA's behind perennial powers USCB and Pepperdine. Two individuals did qualify for the NCAA Championships: Tim Dobias in the 200 and 400-yard IM and Pablo Newallo in the 200-breast.

The Rebel Cross Country team enjoyed a good season as the team qualified for the Far West Regional of the NCAA cross country championships in Oregon. Individually, Melvin Thompson finished second at the PCAA championships and German Aranda took fifth.

One of the few near misses occurred to the Rebel football team in the final game of the season. All they needed was a win over CSU-Long Beach for a trip to the California Bowl and a PCAA championship. Leading 21-17 with a little over a minute to play and CSULB needing to drive 91 yards for the TD, Long Beach QB Todd Dillon drove his team to the winning TD with only seven seconds remaining. The Rebels finished second in the PCAA and had a 7-4 record.

The tennis team had a PCAA champion in number two singles player Scott Warner, who posted a 25-3 season record and swept through three matches to win the PCAA crown.

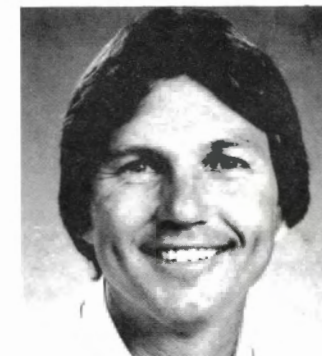

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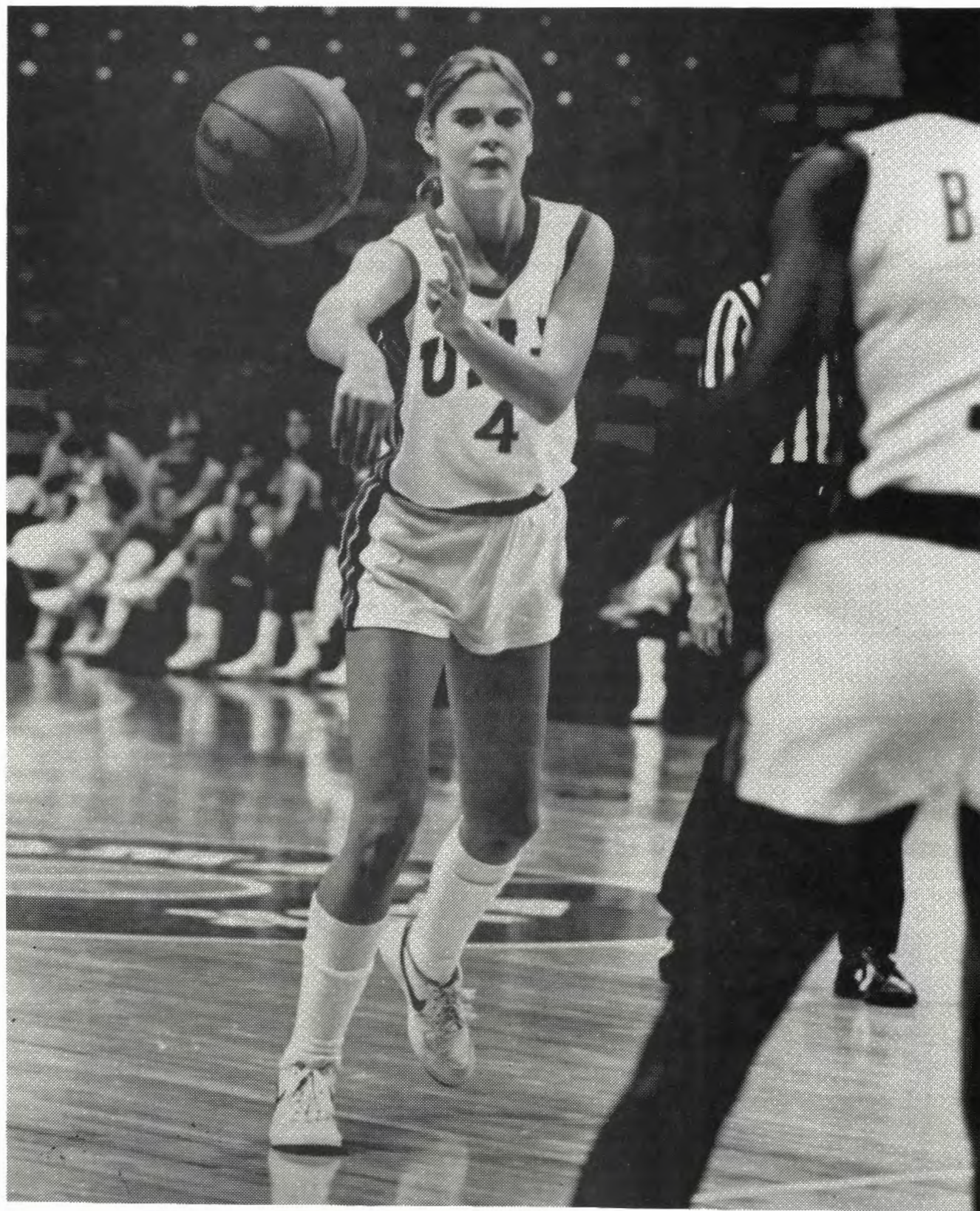

Olympic Experience Boosted Misty's Skills

In Southern California fans of the two-time national champion Lady Trojans of USC speak with near reverence of their star Cheryl Miller.

In Southern Nevada, fans of UNLV's Lady Rebels say they also are blessed to have one of the top woman players in America, one who probably be an All-American this year.

Her name is Misty Thomas, a 5-11 junior out of Windsor, Ontario, Canada, who has guided the Lady Rebs over the past two years from the point guard post.

With Misty's hands on the trottle, the Lady Rebs registered a 24-4 mark during the 1982-83 season, the most successful record in UNLV's history. That was followed by a first-ever PCAA Women's Basketball Championship in the 1983-84 season and a berth in the first round of the NCAA Tournament, another first for the school.

"We've tasted two years of success," Lady Rebel Co-Head Coach Jim Bolla said. "We finally made it to the NCAA Tournament.

Now that we know that it takes to get there, we have to take it one step further."

Despite a 78-58 loss in the first round of the NCAA Tournament to Cal State Long Beach, the 1983-84 campaign was overwhelmingly one of the most prosperous ever for UNLV Women's basketball.

The catalysis for the Lady Rebs' goal of climbing to the top of the collegiate basketball world is Misty Thomas, who developed her talents during the off season through international competition at the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic Games, as a member of the Canadian Olympic team. Thomas was instrumental in leading Canada to a fourth place in Los Angeles.

Last year Misty compiled a 15.5 points per game average, grabbed 6.3 rebounds per game and broke the school record for assists with 180, breaking Sheila Powell's old mark of 174 set in 1976-77.

Thomas also earned CoSIDA Academic All-America honors accumulating a 3.94 grade point average. Along with Danny

Tarkanian, first team Academic All-America on the Rebels' men's team, they became the first-ever Academic All-America tandem in the country.

The Lady Rebs, although blessed with the talents of Misty Thomas, will certainly not be a "one woman team."

Returning to give the Lady Rebs a chance to fulfill their goal of making the NCAA Tournament is Donya Monroe, 6-2 junior. Monroe finished the 1983-84 season as the top rebounder for the team with 8.5 rebounds per game to go with her 11.8 points per game, which made her the third highest scorer on the team.

Also returning are sophomore Angela Christian (6-2) and Charlotte Blair (5-9). Christian saw action last season as the back-up power forward and tallied 7.1 points and 5.2 rebounds per game.

Adding depth to this year's squad are junior Jackie Tefft (6-4) and Kathy LaVern (6-1).
