1983-84 SEASON OUTLOOK

When the UNLV Lady Rebel basketball team was left out of post-season play last year following a sparkling record of 24-4, there may have been some disappointment on the part of staff and fans. After all, it was one of the best seasons in the history of the Lady Rebel program. But it must be realized that much of that team is back which makes the future of the program seem so bright.

Co-Head Coaches Sheila Strike-Bolla and Jim Bolla, in their first season as equal status (Bolla was an assistant previously), are beaming over the prospect of a Top 20 national ranking.

"We have a strong nucleus of sophomore players this year who saw a lot of action as freshmen," said Strike-Bolla. "We are a young team and we also have four new players, but it's deceiving because we do have experience."

That's a combination that the coaching duo, who are married to each other, are counting on to propel the Lady Rebels to even a better season in 1983-84. Back at the guards positions are two players who turned in stellar performances last year. Senior Rochelle Oliver, a 5-7 senior from Bakersfield, CA, was the second leading scorer for the Lady Rebs with a 17.3 average. Oliver was the only player to start all 28 games last year. At the other guard will be Misty Thomas, a 5-11 sophomore from Windsor Ontario, Canada who averaged 12.1 ppg and led the team in assists with 147.

Thomas was one of four freshmen who saw prominent roles last year, something that will have to happen again.

"The freshmen will have to play for us," said Bolla. "They will have the opportunity to play in situations, which will keep some of the pressure off them. It will be a learning experience for them."

"We have four freshmen this year," added Strike-Bolla. "All four have the caliber to play and we're hoping to have at least two contribute this season."

Returning forwards are senior Lori Arent and sophomore Donya Monroe. Arent, a

6-1 transfer from the University of Pittsburgh, missed the first part of last season but then joined the team to play in 19 games and average just under five points/game. A strong inside player, Arent averaged 4.5 rebounds per game.

Monroe, another of last year's super frosh class, started 27 games, scored 10.4 ppg, averaged 8.2 rebounds/game and was tied for second on the team with eight blocked shots.

Both Arent and Monroe saw action at center along with still another freshman Tara Garlepp. The 6-5 sophomore played in 24 games last year, led the team in blocked shots (10) and averaged 6.2 ppg.

The Lady Rebs, however, will miss their co-captains from a year ago.

Leading scorer Penny Welsh (19.9 ppg) and four-year starter Sonia Lykes will leave a void that the rest of the team must fill. Welsh played in all but two games and shot 53% from the floor and 86% from the line. Lykes started in 20 games and shot an amazing 60% from the floor.

"They (Welsh and Lykes) were the team leaders," said Strike-Bolla. "They were the tireless workers who kept everyone up in practice. Their replacements in those aspects won't be determined until we are into the season."

The Lady Rebs will face a more difficult schedule this year. Many of the early games are at home and much of the traveling is toward the end of the season. The coaches wanted this to allow the young players a chance to 'get their feet wet' before the tough opponents on the road.

Some of the games that will test the Lady Rebs this year include the season opener against Cal Berkeley; Houston on Dec. 8; Arizona State in the Budweiser Round Robin Tournament in January; LSU and Louisiana Tech in back-to-back road games Jan. 26 and 28; BYU in February; and the Alaska Tournament featuring Texas and Florida State.

SHEILA STRIKE-BOLLA CO-HEAD COACH



Sheila Strike-Bolla begins her fourth season with the Lady Rebel basketball team. This is the first season that she is sharing, with her husband Jim Bolla, the head coaching duties. Strike-Bolla is 49-32 in her three seasons as head coach, with last year her best, as the team finished with a 24-4 record. Although the Lady Rebels were unranked last year, Strike-Bolla is looking for a national ranking this season as the Lady Rebels will return most of last year's team. With the 1983-84 team being so young, there are only three seniors, UNLV seems

to have the potential for national prominence not only this season, but in seasons to come.

Before coming to the Lady Rebels, she was an assistant for two seasons at the University of Oregon. Prior to that, she coached the girl's varsity at North Delta High School in Delta, British Columbia and the JV at Simon Fraser University in Burnaby, British Columbia.

As a player, Strike-Bolla was on the Canadian Olympic Team for four seasons as an undergraduate, traveling across four continents and competing with some of the finest players in the world. She played in the 1976 Montreal Olympics, the World Student Games in Moscow, the Pan Am Games in Mexico, and the World Championships in Cali, Columbia. Strike-Bolla was also a key player for Laurentian University when it won the Canadian Collegiate Championship in 1974.

Strike-Bolla received her B.A. degree from Laurentian (Sudbury, Ontario) University in 1975 and she earned her M.S. in Physical Education from the University of Oregon.

JIM BOLLA

CO-HEAD COACH



Jim Bolla begins his third year with the Lady Rebels, his first as Co-Head Coach. He had been assistant coach his first two years at UNLV and was promoted for the 1983-84 season.

Before coming to UNLV, Bolla spent three years as a graduate assistant for the University of Pittsburgh's men's basketball team under present Runnin' Rebel Assistant Coach Tim Grgurich. While with Pitt, Bolla was the rebounding specialist for the Panthers, which finished third in the nation in rebounding in 1980. After that, Bolla became a full-time assistant coach for the Pitt women's team.

As a professional player, Bolla spent one season with the Cannon team in Venice, Italy and later was a member of a team of American professionals, who toured South America. As an undergraduate at Pitt, Bolla played center on two Panther post-season tournament teams. In 1974, he was an important member of the team that made it to the final eight in the NCAA Tournament, only to lose to David Thompson-led North Carolina State. In 1975, Bolla was captain of the squad to make the NIT field. He was also a high school All-America while playing for Pittsburgh's Canevin High, the 1969 Pennsylvania state champions.

DAN PENCE

ASSISTANT COACH



Dan Pence begins his third season at UNLV as an assistant coach for the Lady Rebels. His primary responsibility is scouting talent across the country and recruiting players to attend UNLV. The Lady Rebel basketball program recruits on a national level with Pence spending much of his time in the East and South, in addition to traveling around the rest of the country.

As a player, Pence was All-City, All-State, and Honorable Mention All-America at Phoenix (AZ) Central High School. He went on to play in college for both USC and the University of Arizona.

Pence received his B.A. degree in History from the University of Arizona in 1969 and earned his M.A. in Sociology from UNLV in 1981.

PENNY WELSH

STUDENT ASSISTANT



Penny joins the Lady Rebel coaching staff after a successful playing career. A senior history major at UNLV, Penny will go on to pursue a Master's degree in History.

She played two seasons (79-80, 80-81) at the University of Pittsburgh where she earned freshman MVP honors. At Pitt, her sophomore season, she made the National Women's Invitational Tournament All-America team.

Her last two years were spent at UNLV (81-82, 82-83) where she enjoyed two great seasons. She is currently the Lady Rebel's number three all-time scorer (994 points - 18.4 ppg) behind Kathie Calloway and Debra Waddy. Her high game at UNLV came last year against the University of Mississippi when she canned 38 points.

UNLV ENTERS PCAA CONFERENCE

The UNLV Lady Rebels will participate in the PCAA Conference for the first time ever this season. Along with UNLV, California-Irvine and California-Santa Barbara will be members in the conference. UNLV, Irvine, and Santa Barbara will play a home and home series with each other with the PCAA playoffs scheduled for March 4-6.

In November of 1983, meetings will take place to expand the conference for the 1984-85 season. Teams considering entry into the conference include: Utah State, Cal State-Long Beach, Cal State-Fullerton, Fresno State, San Jose State and Pacific.

The first major step for the conference will involve a playoff system. The goal involved is obviously the winner of the conference receiving an automatic NCAA playoff berth. "Dr. (Brad)

Rothermel was a driving force for this league," said Strike-Bolla. "It presents a great opportunity for our women's program to be associated with a fine conference as the PCAA."

Therefore, with the ladies being in the same conference as the men, it could lead to more doubleheader possibilities in the future. In the upcoming 1983-84 season, there are approximately five doubleheaders scheduled.

Overall, being associated with a conference has many advantages. The idea of winning a conference gives a team momentum when gearing up for post-season play. In the past, the Lady Rebels were a major independent, where after seasons end, the program is at the mercy of the NCAA selection committee.



THE BERT LEAVITT MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

A donation in the name of Bert Leavitt was made in the Spring of 1983 to an endowment fund for women's basketball at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. An annual scholarship, the *Bert Leavitt Memorial Scholarship*, will be presented prior to the beginning of each season by Mrs. Joyce Leavitt to a member of the women's basketball team who meets the following criteria: 1) The recipient must be in either her junior or senior year of eligibility at the time of the scholarship; 2) The recipient must have an overall GPA of 3.0 for her college career; 3) The recipient will be chosen by the head coach (Mrs. Joyce Leavitt reserves the right to amend this item at her discretion); 4) In the event that no female basketball players meets all of the above-mentioned criteria in any given year, the award will be presented at the discretion of the head coach.

The recipient of the Bert Leavitt Memorial Scholarship shall receive monies from interest earned on the Bert Leavitt endowment up to the amount specified by NCAA as allowable over and above her basketball scholarship. Remaining monies that represent the balance of interest earned on the Bert Leavitt endowment shall be transferred into the women's basketball scholarship account.

The Bert Leavitt Memorial Scholarship recipient shall receive, in addition to scholarship monies, a small plaque to be provided through funds accrued from the endowment.

The interest earned on the first quarter, ending June 30, 1983, shall be used to purchase a large trophy, upon which names of successive recipients shall be added, to be displayed in the Thomas and Mack Center.

MEDIA INFORMATION

All requests for press and photo passes should be made either by letter or telephone at least one week in advance of the game. Visiting media are required to make their requests through their Sports Information Director. Credentials will not be mailed. Credentials may be picked up the day before each game at the UNLV Sports Information Office or at the Will Call window the day of the game.

Three phones on a first come-first served basis will be available after each game in the UNLV Sports Information Office. Also phones can be used at the Thomas & Mack Center following the game.

Complete game statistics are provided at each Lady Rebel home game. They include team and individual stats, as well as half-time statistics.

UNLV LOCKER ROOM POLICY

Lady Rebel post-game policies confirm to NCAA efforts to assist news media in coverage of Lady Rebel Basketball for the 1983-84 season.

—Co-Head Coaches Sheila Strike-Bolla and Jim Bolla and staff will be available for interviews 10 minutes after they have entered the locker room.

—No cameras or television will be permitted in the dressing areas at the Thomas & Mack Center. Post-game pictures and TV interviews will be allowed at an area provided outside the locker rooms.

—Parents and official visitors will be admitted approximately 20 minutes after the team enters the locker room or upon the coaches discretion.

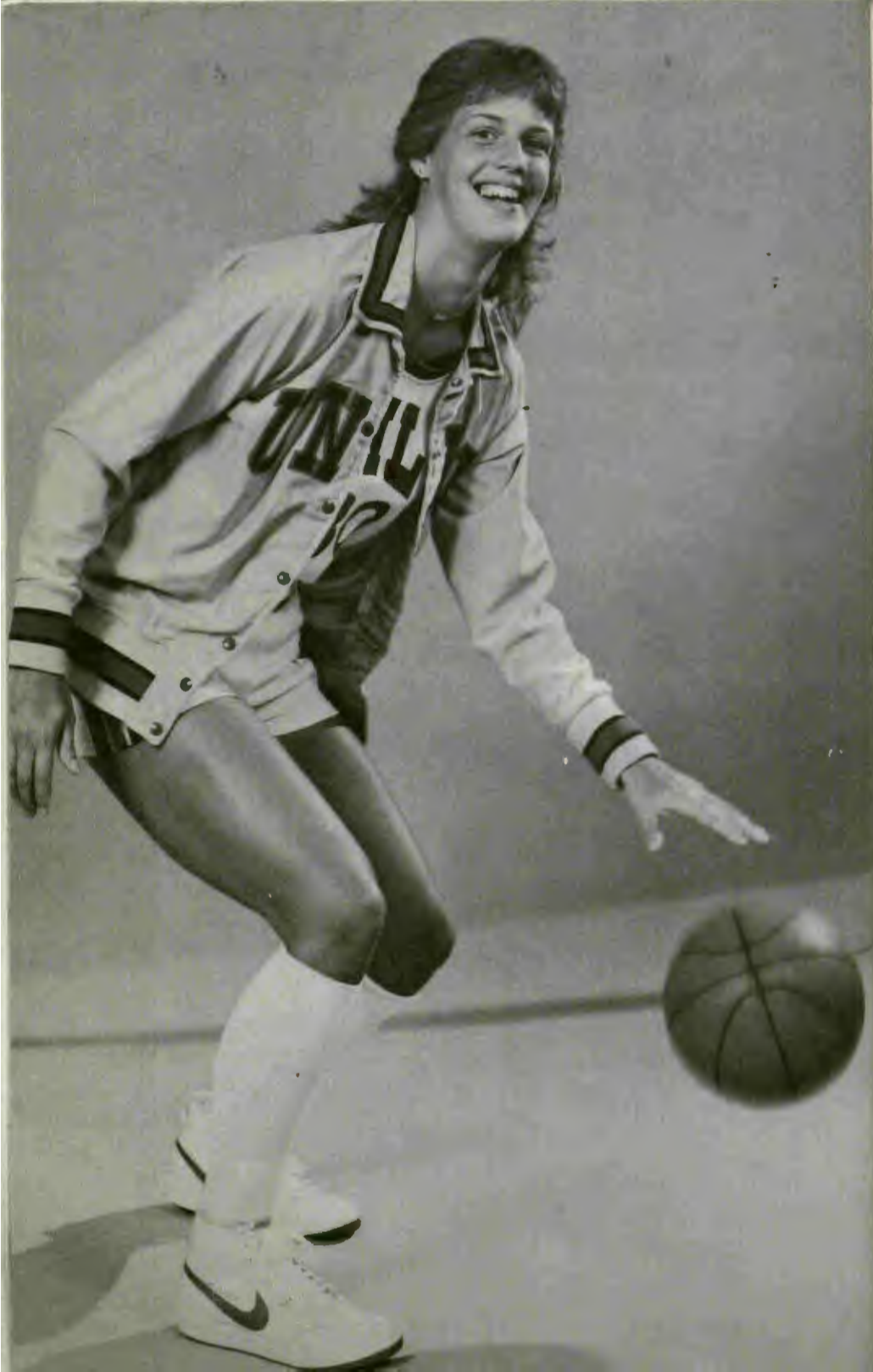

The City

First settled in 1855 as a missionary outpost of the Mormon Church, Las Vegas today has blossomed into a metropolis of more than 450,000 permanent residents. We have new parks, museums, churches, hospitals and libraries.

Our cultural scene is enriched by art galleries, legitimate theatres, a professional ballet company and numerous serious musical organizations. When you live here, you soon realize that the glitter and glamour of the "Strip" is usually left to the tourists; in all the other important ways, Las Vegas is no different than any large city on the move. The advantage is that if you want to take part in Las Vegas' unique entertainment scene, it's there.

For UNLV, this is the picturesque southwestern United States. Within a 30-mile radius lie the shores of Lake Mead, massive Hoover Dam and the Colorado River recreation area, the snow skiing trails of 12,000-foot Mount Charleston, and a panorama of red-rock mountains, eroded sandstone landscapes and forgotten ghost towns. The city is only 4 to 5 hours drive by car from Los Angeles, Phoenix or southern Utah's great national parks.

Las Vegas Facts

Las Vegas (Spanish for "the Meadows") is the seat of Clark County, located in the southern tip of Nevada, bordered by Arizona and the Colorado River on the east and California on the west. The Las Vegas metropolitan area is nestled in a 2,000-foot high desert valley surrounded by mountains that range in height from 5,000 to 12,000 feet.

THE UNIVERSITY

The University of Nevada, Las Vegas, one of the fastest growing institutions of higher education in the southwest, is a component of the University of Nevada System, which is governed by the seven-member Nevada Board of Regents.

THE HISTORY: The past academic year marked UNLV's 25th anniversary. The extensive academic programs provided on UNLV's large, beautiful campus prove the explosive growth of higher education since its birth in southern Nevada. After several years of providing extension courses in southern Nevada staffed by faculty from the University of Nevada in Reno, the state legislature officially established the Southern Regional Division of the university in 1957. That same year the first building on campus—Maude Frazier Hall—was opened. By the mid-1960's, the university had become a four-year degree-granting institution known as Nevada Southern University. Full autonomy, with status equal to UNR, came in 1968. The following year the regents gave the campus its new name: University of Nevada, Las Vegas (UNLV).

THE CAMPUS: The 335-acre campus is located two miles from the Las Vegas Strip in the heart of a busy commercial and residential area. On-campus facilities serve over 11,000 graduate and undergraduate students as well as provide a center for cultural and extended educational experiences for the community. Points of interest on the campus include the following:

Museum of Natural History—With specialized exhibits to illustrate the story of man in this region, the museum is open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday-Saturday. Visiting groups are encouraged to call for arranged tours. There is no admission charge. 739-3381.

Atrium and Aviary—This lush garden and bird sanctuary is located in the lobby of Juanita Greer White Hall. The building is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays. 739-3399.

Art Gallery—Exhibits by students, faculty and nationally renowned artists are changed every 2-3 weeks in the gallery, which is located in the northwest corner of the Alta Ham Fine Arts Building (HFA-153). Hours are noon to 4 p.m., Monday-Saturday.

McDermott Physical Education Center—This large, well equipped facility is open to the public. Hours vary, phone number: 739-3150/3157.

Center for the Performing Arts—At the northern end of the campus mall are two auditoriums: Artemus W. Ham Concert Hall, which is the scene of regularly scheduled concerts (739-3801); and Judy Bayley Theatre, where plays are staged throughout the year (739-3666). On the plaza area between them is The Flashlight, a 38-foot-tall, 74,000-pound steel sculpture by internationally known artist Claes Oldenburg.

THE EXPANSION: During the past three years, UNLV has embarked on an ambitious, \$60 million construction program which has resulted in four new buildings on campus—three of them the direct result of local philanthropy.

Ground was broken in 1981 for the Thomas and Mack Center, an 18,000-seat sports pavilion. Construction is expected to be completed by November 1983, when the Runnin' Rebels take to their new home basketball court. The university expects to book a wide variety of events into this spacious facility, named for long-time university donors E. Parry Thomas and Jerome Mack.

Construction also was completed in 1983 on an \$11.7 million building to house both the College of Business and Economics and the College of Hotel Administration—Frank and Estella Beam Hall (named for the parents of donor Thomas T. Beam). In addition to many specialized facilities to meet the needs of both colleges, the structure features a semi-covered outdoor patio.

A generous gift from local attorney Artemus W. Ham, Jr., provided the seed money for the recently opened Alta Ham Fine Arts Building. Named for Ham's late mother, the \$5 million facility houses the theatre arts, music, art and dance programs. It also contains an innovative Black Box Theatre for smaller-scale theatre productions as well as the campus' Fine Arts Gallery.

Finally, a \$7 million, four-story addition to the James R. Dickinson Library opened in Fall 1981, providing special facilities and more room for the expanded library holdings required by a growing student population.

THE FACULTY: A distinguished faculty of more than 400 men and women are actively involved in teaching, research and community service. Faculty members, 77% with doctorates, have come to UNLV from many of the great learning centers of the country — M.I.T., Yale, Harvard, Berkeley, Stanford.

THE PROGRAMS: Bachelor's degrees are awarded in 48 major subjects, and there are 26 programs which lead to master's degrees. Specialist degrees and doctorates are offered in the field of education. All programs have been fully accredited by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges.

THE CALENDAR: UNLV operates on the semester system, with a Mini Term offered between the fall and spring semesters. During the summer there are two five-week summer sessions. The arrangement of course offerings provides students with a wide range of scheduling possibilities.

THE COMMUNITY: The Las Vegas community is served directly by an ambitious continuing education program at UNLV. Approximately 16,000 local residents take part annually in more than 500 credit and non-credit courses. These "Classes for People" are designed with a wide range of potential students in mind.

DR. LEONARD GOODALL — PRESIDENT



Since his arrival in July 1979, Dr. Leonard E. "Pat" Goodall has presided over UNLV's greatest period of development. With an average student enrollment increase of six percent during each year of his presidency, Goodall has been instrumental in the implementation of a \$60 million construction program to accommodate both the growing student population and the expanding academic programs at this dynamic university. During Dr. Goodall's tenure in office, new master's degree programs have been added in the fields of geoscience, accounting, hotel administration and computer science.

Among his other accomplishments here, Goodall played a major role in the development of the UNLV Foundation. The creation of this organization has improved endowment assistance for faculty development, travel and research as well as bringing outstanding lecturers to the university. At the heart of this program is the "President's Associates," an organization which Goodall established to recognize and encourage systematic giving to the university.

Goodall came to Las Vegas from the Midwest where he had served for eight years as chancellor to the University of Michigan, Dearborn. His background also included administrative service at two other urban universities.

DR. BRAD ROTHERMEL - ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



Dr. Bradley L. Rothermel, Director of the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics, has extensive experience as an athletic administrator.

Prior to his appointment at UNLV in 1981, he was Associate Director and Business Manager for the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics at West Virginia University. From 1974 to 1976 he was employed as Assistant Director and Business Manager for the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics at Kansas State University.

Rothermel supervised the intercollegiate athletic programs for men and women while serving as Director of the Division of Health and Physical Education at George Williams College in Downers Grove, Illinois, from 1971 to 1974.

From 1965 to 1967, he served as Supervisor of Counseling and Research Development while functioning in the capacity of Assistant Athletic Director of the University of Illinois Athletic Association. THOMAS AND MACK CENTER FACTS

The \$30 million Thomas and Mack Center is the newest addition to the Entertainment Capital of the World, located in the heart of Las Vegas on the campus of the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.

Constructed with state-of-the-art engineering capabilities, the Center is an athletic and special events facility. It is the largest structure of its kind in the state of Nevada, and is the fourth largest on-campus arena in the United States.

The Center was specifically designed to handle a wide variety of athletic events including basketball, wrestling, tennis, volleyball, gymnastics, soccer, hockey, ice skating and rodeo but it is also perfect for such events as large or intimate meetings, concerts, conferences and keynote addresses, circuses and commencement exercises.

The most impressive feature of the facility is its 18,000 seat arena. Spectators have optimal sight lines from arm-chair seats in 51 rows on two tiers. Surrounding the arena is spacious, accessible concourse with 44,500 square feet of floor space, easily capable of providing capacity crowd movement, displays or trade shows. The Center's main floor has four expandable meeting rooms, another large meeting room, ticket offices, a restaurant with bar, press room, locker rooms and snack bars.

Overall, the Thomas and Mack Center is 251,450 square feet and is 2,027½ feet above sea level.



Arena-Floor-level retractable seating (9 rows) decreases seating by 2,000.

-Without seating retracted, floor measures 124 feet x 72 feet and has approximately 8,900 square feet of floor space.

-With seating retracted, floor measures 184' x 124' with approximately 22,500 square feet of floor space.

-The basketball surface is portable wood.

-Ceiling height is 127 feet.

-Approximately 1,500-2,000 chairs may be set up on the floor.

Concourse-Measures 34' x 1,300'

-44,500 square feet of floor space.

-Ceiling height varies from 13 feet at sides to 20 at peak.

-Thirty private luxury boxes-a total of 392 seats-are available for rental.

Audio Visual Capabilities-232 foot candles of metal halide light over every square foot of the area provide excellent television lighting.

-Television camera baskets are located on the concourse level and cameras may be set up on ground level.

-40,000 pounds, spread over eight points, can be hung from the arena ceiling.

Parking-41 acres for 5,500 cars. **Ticket Booths**-2 main offices and 4 satellite offices.

Locker Rooms-Six locker rooms, each accommodating 15-20 people. One locker room for game officials.

Scoreboards/Marques-Two multipurpose scoreboards located at each end of the arena.

-Two animated message centers with graphic animation and line-oriented message capabilities are located at mid-court.
